

Company Summary

Investment Policy

Edinburgh Worldwide Investment Trust plc aims to achieve long term capital growth by investing primarily in listed companies throughout the world. Further details of the investment policy are given in the Business Review on page 8.

Comparative Index

The index against which performance is compared is the S&P Global Small Cap Index total return (in sterling terms). Prior to 1 February 2014 the comparative index was the MSCI All Countries World Index (in sterling terms). For periods commencing prior to this date, the returns on these indices for their respective periods are linked together to form a single comparative index.

Management Details

The Company has appointed Baillie Gifford & Co Limited, a wholly owned subsidiary of Baillie Gifford & Co, as its Alternative Investment Fund Manager and Company Secretaries. Baillie Gifford & Co Limited has delegated portfolio management services to Baillie Gifford & Co. Dealing activity and transaction reporting have been further sub-delegated to Baillie Gifford Overseas Limited and Baillie Gifford Asia (Hong Kong) Limited. The Management Agreement can be terminated on three months' notice.

The annual management fee is 0.75% on the first £50 million of net assets, 0.65% on the next £200 million of net assets and 0.55% on the remaining net assets. Management fees are calculated and payable quarterly.

Capital Structure

At the year end the Company's share capital consisted of 354,318,695 fully paid ordinary shares of 1p each. The Company currently has powers to buy back shares at a discount to net asset value per share for cancellation or retention as treasury shares as well as to issue shares/sell treasury shares at a premium to net asset value.

The Company is a member of the Association of Investment Companies.

Chairman's Statement



Covid-19

Much of the period under review has been overshadowed by the Covid-19 pandemic. Quite apart from the devasting human cost, this pandemic has also created enormous economic and business disruption. In response to these challenges, Baillie Gifford and other third-party service providers have adopted remote working practices and protocols, making full use of technology, in order to continue to provide a full service that has progressed uninterrupted. I am pleased to report that, as a result of these efforts, the oversight and management of the Company's affairs has proceeded without significant dislocation due to the pandemic. However, there have, of course, been some enforced operational changes to the way we operate, for instance undertaking Board meetings online and the restrictions on holding physical General Meetings of the Company.


Performance

In the year to 31 October 2020, the Company's net asset value ('NAV') per share, when calculated by deducting borrowings at fair value, increased by 57.8% and the share price by 63.9%, both in total return terms. The comparative index, the S&P Global Small Cap Index* total return, increased by 0.4% in sterling terms during this period. Over the course of the financial year the share price averaged a 2.0% premium to net assets, with borrowings deducted at par value. Portfolio turnovert was 8.4% compared to 4.5% in 2019 and the ongoing charges have reduced to 0.72% from 0.75%.

Over the last twelve months the majority of holdings in the portfolio have contributed to the good relative and absolute performance. Of note has been the performance of: Tesla, an electric car, autonomous driving and solar energy company; Ocado, an online grocery retailer and technology provider; Teladoc, a telemedicine service provider; and Chegg, an online education company. In aggregate, the underlying performance of the holdings in the portfolio continues to progress as hoped and in some cases events of the past year have accelerated this trend. Greater detail on this can be found within the Managers' Review on pages 12 to 14.

The Company's portfolio has been managed with a focus on the opportunity set lower down the market capitalisation spectrum since the end of January 2014 and I would recommend shareholders read the portfolio managers' articulation of their investment practice and philosophy in the Managers' Review and the subsequent pages. It is pleasing to note the 221.9% growth in the NAV (total return) since then is significantly ahead of the 83.8% achieved by the comparative index. The chart below shows the distribution of returns for all the stocks held within the portfolio since 31 January 2014; each bar representing the return of each stock whilst held in the portfolio. This cumulative period holding analysis shows the broad distribution of returns achieved by the holdings from time of initial purchase to 31 October 2020 or the date in which the holding was fully sold from the portfolio.

Share Buybacks, Treasury and Issuance

The Company will once again be seeking to renew its share buyback, issuance and treasury share authorities. The buyback facility is sought to allow the Company to buy back its own shares when the discount is substantial in absolute terms and relative to its peers. Issuance, either from treasury or of new shares, will only be undertaken at a premium to the prevailing NAV, with debt calculated at par, in order to satisfy natural market demand. Issuance at a premium enhances the NAV per share for existing shareholders, dilutes ongoing costs and helps with the trading liquidity of the shares of the Company.

At the end of October 2019, the Company had a market capitalisation of around £530.8 million and was a constituent of the FTSE Small Cap Index. Twelve months on, this was £1,018.7 million and the Company is now a constituent of the FTSE 250 Index, having been promoted over the summer. Over the course of the last financial year, the Company has issued over 51.7 million new shares at a premium to its NAV, raising net proceeds of £133.0 million and increasing the NAV per share by 0.44%. This equates to 17.1% of the issued share capital at the start of the year and the Company has published a Prospectus in order to enable it to issue more than 20% over a twelve-month period. Stock issuance, along with good investment performance and the tiered management fee, has contributed to the reduction in the Company's ongoing charges for the year.

Unlisted Investments

The Managers have shareholder authority to invest up to 15% of the Company's total assets, at the time of initial investment, in unlisted investments. As at the Company's year end, the portfolio weighting in unlisted investments stood at 5.8% of total assets, invested in nine companies (2019 – 5.5% of total assets in seven companies). Two new unlisted investments were made during the year: Epic Games, a US gaming platform; and, Graphcore Limited, a UK developer of intelligent computing solutions. Additions were made to the existing investments in Oxford Nanopore Technologies, Reaction Engines and Space Exploration Technologies ('SpaceX'). The other unlisted investments in the portfolio are Akili Interactive Labs, KSQ Therapeutics, PsiQuantum and Spire Global.

Borrowings

The extent and range of equity gearing is discussed by the Board and Managers at each Board meeting. Both parties agree that the Company should typically be geared to equities to maximise potential returns, with the current aspirational parameters set at +5% to +15% of shareholders' funds. Over the year, the invested equity gearing ranged between -1.0% and +6.6%, and stood at +0.9% of shareholders' funds at the financial year end (2019 – +6.6%).

As at 31 October 2020, the Company had a five year £25 million revolving credit facility with National Australia Bank Limited with an expiry date of 29 June 2023 and an additional five year £36 million revolving credit facility with National Australia Bank Limited with an expiry date of 30 September 2024. As at 31 October 2020, the Company had drawings of €2,821,800, US\$37,090,500 and £17,500,000 (equating to total borrowings of £48,728,000 in sterling terms).

Earnings and Dividend

The Company's objective is that of generating capital growth and investors should not expect any income from this investment. This year the net revenue return per share was a negative 0.46p (2019 – negative 0.23p). As the revenue account is running at a deficit, no final dividend is being recommended by the Board. Should the level of underlying income increase in future years, the Board will seek to distribute to shareholders the minimum permissible to maintain investment trust status by way of a final dividend.

Board Composition

I am pleased to report that during the course of the year both Ms Caroline Roxburgh and Mr Jonathan Simpson-Dent were appointed to the Board with effect from 1 February 2020. Caroline, a qualified Chartered Accountant, is a former partner with a global professional services firm and has over thirty years' experience advising boards on business management, risk and assurance. Jonathan, also a qualified Chartered Accountant, has spent the majority of his career running entrepreneurial private equity and listed mid-cap businesses across multiple sectors. Both appointments fall to be ratified by shareholders as part of the 20 January 2021 Annual General Meeting business. Further information on their respective backgrounds can be found on pages 23 and 24.

In my report last year, I highlighted that Mr William Ducas intended to retire from the Board in 2020. Due to the uncertainties arising from the Covid-19 pandemic, and bearing in mind that the Board has been unable to meet in person since January 2020, the Board has asked William to defer his retirement in order to provide continuity and to enable the Company to benefit from his considerable experience. Accordingly, William will stand for re-election to the Board for one final time. It is intended that William will retire from the Board by the end of June, 2021.

Investment Outlook

The past year has been marked by continued market turbulence and dislocation driven largely as a consequence of Covid-19. Further uncertainty has been created by the US Presidential election and, closer to home, the continuing Brexit negotiations. Rather than focusing on macro-economic developments, your portfolio managers continue to direct their efforts to picking the best entrepreneurial, immature growth companies that create and exploit investment opportunities, and which exhibit excellent long-term growth prospects.

Enforced or abrupt shocks to the system act to melt away inertia. Events of 2020 have seemingly accelerated the rate of change that companies and business models are undergoing with a push for more flexibility across multiple fronts and digital-first models prevailing. Your Company's portfolio is well-positioned for this. It should not come as a surprise therefore that the portfolio managers and Board remain enthused by the prospects for the holdings within the portfolio. Whilst markets exhibit volatility, the investment trust structure permits the portfolio managers and discerning long-term investors to take positions in exciting, dynamic and innovative companies for the long term.

Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Company will be held at Baillie Gifford's offices in Edinburgh at 12 noon on Wednesday 20 January 2021. It is intended that the meeting itself will involve the minimum number of people necessary for it to be quorate. The Directors consider that all resolutions put to shareholders are in their and the Company's best interests as a whole and recommend that shareholders vote in their favour.

As a consequence of Covid-19 and the uncertainty regarding government policy on group meetings, shareholders are being encouraged to submit their votes by proxy ahead of the meeting rather than attempt to do so in person; anyone not authorised to attend will likely be declined entry for health reasons. Shareholders who hold shares in their own name on the main register will be provided with a Form of Proxy and there are also special arrangements for holders of shares through the Aberdeen Standard Investments Share Plan, Individual Savings Account and Investment Plan for Children who are provided with a Form of Direction. If you hold shares through a share platform or other nominee, the Board would encourage you to contact these organisations directly as soon as possible to arrange for you to submit votes in advance of the Annual General Meeting.







Business Review

Business Model

Business and Status

Edinburgh Worldwide Investment Trust plc ('the Company') is a public company limited by shares and incorporated in Scotland. The Company is an investment company within the meaning of section 833 of the Companies Act 2006 and carries on business as an investment trust. Investment trusts are UK public listed companies and their shares are traded on the London Stock Exchange. They invest in a portfolio of assets in order to spread risk. The Company has a fixed share capital although, subject to shareholder approval sought annually, it may purchase its own shares or issue shares. The price of the Company's shares is determined, like other listed shares, by supply and demand.

The Company has been approved as an investment trust by HM Revenue & Customs subject to the Company continuing to meet the eligibility conditions. The Directors are of the opinion that the Company has continued to conduct its affairs so as to enable it to comply with the ongoing requirements of section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and the Investment Trust (Approved Company) (Tax) Regulations 2011.

The Company is an Alternative Investment Fund for the purposes of the EU Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive.

Objective and Policy

The Company's current investment objective and policy is set out below.

Edinburgh Worldwide's investment objective is the achievement of long term capital growth by investing primarily in listed companies throughout the world.

While the policy is global investment, the approach adopted is to construct a portfolio through the identification of individual companies which offer long term growth potential, normally over at least a five year horizon and which typically have a market capitalisation of less than US\$5bn at the time of initial investment. The portfolio is actively managed and does not seek to track the comparative index hence a degree of volatility against the index is inevitable.

In constructing the equity portfolio a spread of risk is achieved by diversifying the portfolio through investment in:

- 75 to 125 holdings;
- a minimum of 6 countries; and
- a minimum of 15 industries.

On acquisition, no holding shall exceed 5% of total assets and no more than 15% of the Company's total assets will be invested in other listed investment companies. No more than 10% of the Company's total assets will be invested in other pooled vehicles, such as open ended funds.

Unlisted investments may be held. On acquisition of any unlisted investment, the Company's aggregate holding in unlisted investments shall not exceed 15% of total assets. From time to time, fixed interest holdings or non equity investments, may be held on an opportunistic basis.

Derivative instruments are not normally used but, in certain circumstances and with the prior approval of the Board, their use may be considered either as a hedge or to exploit an investment opportunity.

The Company recognises the long term advantages of gearing and would seek to have a maximum gearing level of 30% of shareholders' funds in the absence of exceptional market conditions.

Borrowings are invested when it is considered that investment grounds merit the Company taking a geared position. Gearing levels, and the extent of gearing, are discussed by the Board and Managers at every Board Meeting.

Performance

At each Board meeting, the Directors consider a number of performance measures to assess the Company's success in achieving its objectives.

Key Performance Indicators

The key performance indicators ('KPIs') used to measure the progress and performance of the Company over time are established industry measures and are as follows:

- the movement in net asset value per ordinary share (after deducting borrowings at fair value);
- the movement in the share price;
- the movement of the net asset value and share price compared to the comparative index;
- the premium/discount of the share price to the net asset value per share; and
- the ongoing charges.

An explanation of these measures can be found in the Glossary of Terms and Alternative Performance Measures on pages 72 and 73.

The one, five and ten year records of the KPIs are shown on pages 5, 6 and 7, respectively.

Borrowings

At 31 October 2020 and 31 October 2019 the Company had a five year £25 million revolving credit facility with National Australia Bank Limited with an expiry date of 29 June 2023 and a five year £36 million revolving credit facility with National Australia Bank Limited with an expiry date of 30 September 2024. At 31 October 2020 the drawings were €1,410,900, US\$18,545,250 and £9,185,037 under the £25 million floating rate facility and €1,410,900, US\$18,545,250 and £8,314,963 under the £36 million floating rate facility. At 31 October 2019 the drawings were €1,410,900, US\$18,545,250 and £8,750,000 under each of the two revolving credit facilities (see note 10 on page 55 for the sterling equivalent at each year end).

Principal and Emerging Risks

As explained on page 31 there is an ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the risks faced by the Company on a regular basis. The Directors have carried out a robust assessment of the principal and emerging risks facing the Company, including those that would threaten its business model, future performance, regulatory compliance, solvency or liquidity. There have been no significant changes to the principal risks during the year. A description of these risks and how they are being managed or mitigated is set out below.

The Board considers the coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic and Brexit to be factors which exacerbate existing risks, rather than new emerging risks. Their impact is considered within the relevant risks.

Financial Risk - the Company's assets consist mainly of listed securities and its principal financial risks are therefore market related and include market risk (comprising currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk), liquidity risk and credit risk. An explanation of those risks and how they are managed is contained in note 16 to the Financial Statements on pages 57 to 63. The Board has, in particular, considered the impact of heightened market volatility since the coronavirus outbreak. As oversight of this risk, the Board considers at each meeting various metrics including the composition and diversification of the portfolio by geographies, sectors and capitalisation along with sales and purchases of investments. Individual investments are discussed with the portfolio managers together with their general views on the various investment markets and sectors. A strategy meeting is held annually. The Board has considered the potential impact on sterling from the remaining Brexit related uncertainties. The value of the Company's investment portfolio would be affected by any impact, positively or negatively, on sterling but would be partially offset by the effect of exchange movements on the Company's US\$ and € denominated borrowings.

Investment Strategy Risk – pursuing an investment strategy to fulfil the Company's objective which the market perceives to be unattractive or inappropriate, or the ineffective implementation of an attractive or appropriate strategy, may lead to reduced returns for shareholders and, as a result, a decreased demand for the Company's shares. This may lead to the Company's shares trading at a widening discount to their net asset value. To mitigate this risk, the Board regularly reviews and monitors the Company's objective and investment policy and strategy, the investment portfolio and its performance, the level of discount/premium to net asset value at which the shares trade and movements in the share register and raises any matters of concern with the Managers.

Discount Risk – the discount/premium at which the Company's shares trade relative to its net asset value can change. The risk of a widening discount is that it may undermine investor confidence in the Company. The Board monitors the level of discount/premium at which the shares trade and the Company has authority to buy back its existing shares or issue shares (including authority to sell shares held in treasury), when deemed by the Board to be in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders.

Regulatory Risk – failure to comply with applicable legal and regulatory requirements such as the tax rules for investment trust companies, the FCA Listing Rules and the Companies Act could lead to suspension of the Company's Stock Exchange listing, financial penalties, a qualified audit report or the Company being subject to tax on capital gains. To mitigate this risk, Baillie Gifford's Business Risk, Internal Audit and Compliance Departments provide regular reports to the Audit and Management Engagement Committee on Baillie Gifford's monitoring programmes. Major regulatory change could impose disproportionate compliance burdens on the Company. In such circumstances representation is made to ensure that the special circumstances of investment

trusts are recognised. Shareholder documents and announcements, including the Company's published Interim and Annual Report and Financial Statements, are subject to stringent review processes, and procedures are in place to ensure adherence to the Transparency Directive and the Market Abuse Directive with reference to inside information.

Custody and Depositary Risk – safe custody of the Company's assets may be compromised through control failures by the Depositary, including breaches of cyber security. To monitor potential risk, the Audit and Management Engagement Committee receives six monthly reports from the Depositary confirming safe custody of the Company's assets held by the Custodian. Cash and portfolio holdings are independently reconciled to the Custodian's records by the Managers who also agree uncertificated unlisted portfolio holdings to confirmations from investee companies. In addition, the existence of assets is subject to annual external audit and the Custodian's audited internal controls reports are reviewed by Baillie Gifford's Business Risk Department and a summary of the key points is reported to the Audit and Management Engagement Committee and any concerns investigated.

Small Company Risk – the Company has investments in smaller, immature companies which are generally considered higher risk as changes in their share prices may be greater and the shares may be harder to sell. Smaller, immature companies may do less well in periods of unfavourable economic conditions. To mitigate this risk, the Board reviews the investment portfolio at each meeting and discusses the merits and characteristics of individual investments with the Managers. A spread of risk is achieved by holding stocks classified across at least fifteen industries and six countries.

Unlisted Investments – the Company's risk is increased by its investment in unlisted investments. These assets may be more difficult to buy or sell, so changes in their prices may be greater. To mitigate this risk, the Board considers the unlisted investments in the context of the overall investment strategy and provides guidance to the Managers on the maximum exposure to unlisted investments.

The emergence of the Covid-19 pandemic has heightened the estimation uncertainty for each of the unquoted investments held. The Managers have categorised each portfolio company as being subject to potentially higher or lower estimation uncertainty by considering a range of factors including the potential disruption to business activities caused by measures adopted to tackle the spread of Covid-19 and the availability and extent of cash resources and have been monitoring the valuations with greater frequency.

Operational Risk – failure of Baillie Gifford's systems or those of other third party service providers could lead to an inability to provide accurate reporting and monitoring or a misappropriation of assets. To mitigate this risk, Baillie Gifford has a comprehensive business continuity plan which facilitates continued operation of the business in the event of a service disruption (including any disruption resulting from the coronavirus outbreak) or major disaster. Since the introduction of the Covid-19 restrictions, almost all Baillie Gifford staff have been working from home and operations have continued very largely as normal. The Audit and Management Engagement Committee reviews Baillie Gifford's

Report on Internal Controls and the reports by other key third party providers are reviewed by Baillie Gifford on behalf of the Board and a summary of the key points is reported to the Audit and Management Engagement Committee and any concerns investigated. The other key third party service providers have not experienced significant operational difficulties affecting their respective services to the Company.

Leverage Risk – the Company may borrow money for investment purposes. If the investments fall in value, any borrowings will magnify the impact of this loss. If borrowing facilities are not renewed, the Company may have to sell investments to repay borrowings. To mitigate this risk, all borrowings require the prior approval of the Board and leverage levels are discussed by the Board and Managers at every meeting. Covenant levels are monitored regularly. Details of the Company's current borrowing facilities and drawings can be found in note 10 on page 55. The majority of the Company's investments are in quoted securities that are readily realisable. Further information on leverage can be found in note 18 on page 64 and the Glossary of Terms and Alternative Performance Measures on pages 72 and 73.

Political and Associated Economic Risk – the Board is of the view that political change in areas in which the Company invests or may invest may have practical consequences for the Company. Political developments are closely monitored and considered by the Board. Following the departure of the UK from the European Union on 31 January 2020, the Board continues to assess the potential consequences for the Company's future activities. Whilst there remains considerable uncertainty, the Board believes that the Company's global portfolio, with only a moderate exposure to the United Kingdom, positions the Company to be suitably insulated from Brexit-related risk.

Viability Statement

In accordance with provision 31 of the UK Corporate Governance Code, that the Directors assess the prospects of the Company over a defined period, the Directors have elected to do so over a period of five years. The Directors continue to believe this period to be appropriate as it is reflective of the longer term investment strategy of the Company, and to be a period during which, in the absence of any adverse change to the regulatory environment and to the favourable tax treatment afforded to UK investment trusts, they do not expect there to be any significant change to the current principal risks facing the Company nor to the adequacy of the mitigating controls in place. Furthermore, the Directors do not reasonably envisage any change in strategy or objectives or any events that would prevent the Company from continuing to operate over that period.

In considering the viability of the Company, the Directors have conducted a robust assessment of each of the Company's principal and emerging risks and uncertainties as detailed on pages 8 to 10 and in particular the impact of market risk where a significant fall in the global equity markets would adversely impact the value of the Company's investment portfolio. The Directors have also considered the Company's leverage and liquidity in the context of the unsecured floating rate loan facilities which are due to expire in June 2023 and September 2024, the income and expenditure projections and the fact that the Company's

investments comprise mainly readily realisable quoted equity securities which can be sold to meet funding requirements if necessary. Specific leverage and liquidity stress testing was conducted during the year, including consideration of the risk of further market deterioration resulting from the coronavirus outbreak. The stress testing did not indicate any matters of concern. The Company's primary third party suppliers, including its Managers and Secretaries, Custodian and Depositary, Registrar, Auditor and Broker, are not experiencing significant operational difficulties affecting their respective services to the Company. In addition, as substantially all of the essential services required by the Company are outsourced to third party service providers, this allows key service providers to be replaced at relatively short notice where necessary.

The Board has specifically considered the UK's departure from the European Union on 31 January 2020 and does not consider that this would affect the going concern status or viability of the Company.

Based on the Company's processes for monitoring operating costs, share price discount/premium, the Managers' compliance with the investment objective, asset allocation, the portfolio risk profile, leverage, counterparty exposure, liquidity risk and financial controls, the Directors have concluded that there is a reasonable expectation that the Company will be able to continue in operation and meet its liabilities as they fall due over the next five years as a minimum.

Promoting the Success of the Company (Section 172 Statement)

Under section 172 of the Companies Act 2006, the directors of a company must act in the way they consider, in good faith, would be most likely to promote the success of the company for the benefit of its members as a whole, and in doing so have regard (amongst other matters and to the extent applicable) to:

- (a) the likely consequences of any decision in the long term;
- (b) the interests of the company's employees;
- (c) the need to foster the company's business relationships with suppliers, customers and others;
- (d) the impact of the company's operations on the community and the environment;
- (e) the desirability of the company maintaining a reputation for high standards of business conduct; and
- (f) the need to act fairly as between members of the company.

In this context, having regard to Edinburgh Worldwide being an externally managed investment company with no employees, the Board considers the Company's key stakeholders to be: its existing and potential shareholders; its externally-appointed Manager (Baillie Gifford); other professional service providers (corporate broker, registrar, auditor and depositary); lenders; wider society and the environment where applicable.

The Board considers that the interests of the Company's key stakeholders are aligned, in terms of wishing to see the Company deliver sustainable long-term growth, in line with the Company's stated objective and strategy, and meet the highest standards of legal, regulatory, and commercial conduct, with the differences between stakeholders being merely a matter of emphasis on those elements. The Board's methods for assessing the Company's progress in the context of its stakeholders' interests are set out below.

The Board places great importance on communication with shareholders. The Annual General Meeting provides the key forum for the Board and Managers to present to shareholders on the Company's performance, future plans and prospects. It also allows shareholders the opportunity to meet with the Board and Managers and raise questions and concerns. The Chairman is available to meet with shareholders as appropriate independently of the Managers. The Managers communicate regularly with current and potential shareholders and their representatives, reporting their views back to the Board. Directors can also attend investor presentations, in order to gauge sentiment first hand. Investors may also communicate with members of the Board at any time by writing to them at the Company's registered office or to the Company's broker. These communication opportunities help inform the Board when considering how best to promote the success of the Company for the benefit of all stakeholders over the long term. The Board of Edinburgh Worldwide Investment Trust plc (Edinburgh Worldwide) recognises the public health risk associated with the Covid-19 outbreak arising from public gatherings and notes the continuing Government's measures restricting such gatherings, travel and attendances at workplaces. At the same time, the Board is conscious of the legal requirement for Edinburgh Worldwide to hold its AGM before the end of April 2021. Given the current uncertainty around when public health concerns will have abated, the Board has for the time being decided to aim to follow the Company's corporate timetable and, accordingly, the Company's AGM is being convened to take place at 12 noon on Wednesday, 20 January 2021, most likely without access for shareholders. The Board will, however, continue to monitor developments and any changes will be advised to shareholders and details will be updated on the Company's website.

The Board seeks to engage with its Managers and other service providers in a collaborative and collegiate manner, encouraging open and constructive discussion and debate, whilst also ensuring that appropriate and regular challenge is brought and evaluation conducted. This approach aims to enhance service levels and strengthen relationships with the Company's providers, with a view to ensuring the interests of the Company are best served by keeping cost levels proportionate and competitive, and by maintaining the highest standards of business conduct.

Whilst the Company's operations are limited, as third-party service providers conduct all substantive operations, the Board is aware of the need to consider the impact of the Company's investment strategy and policy on wider society and the environment. The Board considers that its oversight of environmental, social and governance ('ESG') matters is an important part of its responsibility to all stakeholders and that consideration of ESG factors sits naturally with the Managers' longstanding aim of providing a sustainable basis for adding value for shareholders.

The Board recognises the importance of keeping the interests of the Company and its stakeholders, in aggregate, and of acting fairly between them, firmly front of mind in its key decision making. The Company Secretaries are at all times available to the Board to ensure that suitable consideration is given to the range of factors to which the Directors should have regard. In addition to ensuring that the Company's stated investment objective was being pursued, key decisions and actions during the year which required the Directors to have regard to applicable section 172 factors included:

- as part of ongoing Board succession and refreshment, the appointment and induction of Ms Caroline Roxburgh and Mr Jonathan Simpson-Dent on 1 February 2020 (see pages 23 and 24). These appointments are consistent with the AIC Corporate Governance Code principle that 'a successful company is led by an effective board, whose role is to promote the long-term sustainable success of the company, generating value for shareholders and contributing to wider society';
- the raising of over £133 million from new share issuance, at a
 premium to net asset value, in order to satisfy investor demand
 over the year, which also serves the interests of current
 shareholders by reducing costs per share and helping to further
 improve liquidity;
- once its existing authority had been utilised, issuing two separate Circulars and a Prospectus and seeking shareholder approval on two separate occasions to enable the Company to issue more shares on a premium to net asset value to satisfy ongoing investor demand; and
- the Company being promoted to the FTSE 250 index and the additional reporting requirements.

Employees, Human Rights and Community Issues

The Board recognises the requirement to provide information about employees, human rights and community issues. As the Company has no employees, all its Directors are non-executive and all its functions are outsourced, there are no disclosures to be made in respect of employees, human rights and community issues.

Gender Representation

The Board comprises seven Directors, five male and two female. The Company has no employees. The Board's policy on diversity is set out on page 30.

Environmental, Social and Governance Policy

Details of the Company's policy on socially responsible investment can be found under Corporate Governance and Stewardship on page 32.

The Company considers that it does not fall within the scope of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and it is not, therefore, obliged to make a slavery and human trafficking statement. In any event, the Company considers its supply chains to be of low risk as its suppliers are typically professional advisers. A statement by the Managers under the Act has been published on the Managers' website at www.bailliegifford.com.

Managers' Review

What we seek to offer

Investing the hard-earned savings of others is a privilege. That feeling carries even greater significance when the potential outcomes from that investment go beyond financial returns and have a real-world benefit. However, we do not say that out of any sense of self-importance for what we seek to do as growth investors. Our preference towards ambitious, 'problem-solving' companies comes from a belief that the innovation and progress that they foster can significantly improve the quality of outcomes in a diverse range of industries over the long term. We concede that such a process is fiendishly difficult to track with standard economic or financial metrics. But given patience and an acceptance of delayed gratification the outcomes can be substantial – both in terms of financial returns but also in the benefits which can accrue to the wider world along the way.

As the frontiers of innovation continue to broaden and deepen, we are encouraged to find the opportunities, perhaps even the requirement, for this dual-faceted approach to investment are growing. We see several illustrations of this in the stocks which have driven the Company's asset growth over the past year and also in the recent additions to the portfolio, both discussed in greater detail later in this report.

In seeking out companies that can really make a difference we prefer to point our idea-generation radar lower down the market capitalisation spectrum. The reason for this is twofold. First, the traits that we believe are most associated with propelling companies on a path to greatness seem to be more commonly associated with younger, highly ambitious smaller companies (even if such companies are still rare in absolute frequency). Such traits include a willingness to experiment with new approaches, a vision that identifies and works towards a better way of solving a problem, the ability to galvanise a team around an ambitious goal, retaining a degree of nimbleness and entrepreneurial tenacity to adapt to the evolving challenge. To be clear, such traits are not exclusive to ambitious smaller companies, but their applicability and impact often count for more if allowed to flourish outside the constraints of bureaucracy and a large company mindset. Second, to really unlock the compounding power of long-term growth investing we believe it is important to identify high potential businesses early on their evolutionary path. We fully recognise that identifying opportunities 'early' doesn't necessarily map perfectly to them being 'small' companies in stock market terms (an important reasoning behind our growing base of unlisted holdings in the portfolio). However, the broad tenet of a company's size potentially capturing latent, undiscovered potential holds true given the tendency of stock markets to pay only for what they can see.

Whereas positive share price performance in some of the portfolio holdings means they can no longer be conventionality labelled as 'small' we believe they retain many of the attributes that initially attracted us to them. Moreover, these attributes can now synergise with operational progress and commercial clout. While the price appreciation unavoidably eats into some of the pure potential these companies initially offered us, a more relevant impact is likely to be a marked derisking of progress from this point onwards. They may not be 'small' but they are immature to where we believe they might ultimately reach and their early success on that journey makes us more confident that they can progress from being good to truly great investments.

Reflections on the current year

2020 has witnessed a truly staggering turn of events with enforced adaptation by individuals, institutions, business and society. While the costs to healthcare systems are still widespread and ongoing, there does at least appear to be a path to progress based on a deeper understanding of Covid-19 as a disease and therapeutic agents that can either mitigate its impact or severely blunt its spread. In under a year since an unknown, insidious pathogen emerged it has been extensively characterised, a range of diagnostic tests developed, therapies fast-tracked and vaccines developed and extensively tested. The speed at which this insight has been gleaned and then harnessed is breath-taking and speaks to much of the accelerated entrepreneurial spirit we discussed earlier.

In this year's Interim Report, we explored what might be the legacy of the Covid-19 pandemic. We noted that previous unexpected crises, albeit very different in nature to the pandemic, had typically served as longer term catalysts for a change in behaviours and propelled a new wave of business opportunity. At the core of this thesis is the belief that constraints breed resourcefulness and ingenuity, something we feel to be both micro and macro in scope. In its simplest form it encourages adaptability at the individual level: an openness to engage with new practices through the melting away of embedded scepticism and inertia. In its more abstract form, it will provide the fuel to the innovators and the entrepreneur to build for the future.

Our growing sense is that this adaptation will underpin an acceleration in the rate of change across many aspects of our lives. Much has been written around the immediate adaption that was required: the surging e-commerce orders, the rapid shift to digital forms for delivering healthcare, education and entertainment etc. While some of this will undoubtedly normalise, in many cases it will simply whet the appetite amongst both consumers and businesses as to just what is possible. Greater volume through these channels will drive the virtuous circle of scale, greater investment and ongoing improvement. In many areas it feels as if the path to offerings that are both better and cheaper is tantalisingly close if not here already.





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The acceleration to which we refer, both that observed to date and that which we would expect to come through over the coming years, is not merely about growth rates. The more profound dynamic at work is that digital first business models will increasingly become the accepted norm in many areas. As we have seen in the rise of the internet over the past two decades, competitive dynamics in a digital world tend to operate around first mover advantage and reinforcing networks effects. Consequently, a likely effect of the pandemic will be accelerated evolution in competitive dynamics in areas of huge opportunity with the spoils of success accruing at a faster rate to a smaller number of winners. As such we see our challenge to be about identifying the companies best positioned to exploit the opportunity over the coming years. Growth rates will be an output from that but more significant will be the strategic positioning and evolutionary path that a business is likely

We are acutely aware that many individuals and businesses will bear a huge cost from the current pandemic with the financial and economic impacts reverberating for many years. The companies we invest in are clearly not cocooned from this backdrop. However, for the sizable majority of the portfolio's holdings the opportunity afforded by structural growth, disrupting incumbents and taking of market share are likely to comfortably offset any economic headwind over the longer term. In actively looking for companies that are innovating and trying to move the world forward we believe we are concentrating on an opportunity set whose own actions will be the greatest determinant of their own success or failure. As observers along frontiers of innovation in a wide range of industries and applications we continue to be excited by the opportunities that abound. Consequently, we feel that the current portfolio and investment approach is as relevant as it's ever been.

Portfolio update

In aggregate the portfolio has performed strongly in the year to 31 October 2020. This was driven by several stocks producing sizable gains over the period exemplified by 22 holdings more than doubling their share price and 7 holdings more than tripling. The most significant contribution to performance came from the long-standing position in Tesla, the electric vehicle company. Through broadening its manufacturing footprint, expanding its product range and a widening of the competitive gap on several fronts versus the incumbent automotive companies, Tesla continues to capitalise on its initial status as a technology-powered disruptor in a vast end market. Ongoing battery and autonomous driving developments combined with likely benefits of manufacturing scale in the face of robust demand give us confidence that the company can further build on its growth strength and differentiation. We did make a reduction to the holding, but this was based on maintaining portfolio diversification. Despite this, it remains our largest portfolio holding at year end and we are excited about the path from here.

The consequences of decades worth of over reliance upon fossil fuel burning as the dominant energy source is arguably the most daunting challenge facing the world. Increasingly we expect significant entrepreneurial resource to be directed at this challenge and while still early in that response progress at companies like Tesla, or the UK fuel cell company Ceres Power, give some cause for optimism.

The robust contribution to performance from holdings such as Ocado (online grocery), Teladoc (telemedicine), Chegg (online education), MarketAxess (electronic bond trading), Zillow (online property portal) and Wayfair (online home furnishings) are indicative of the ascendency of digital platforms in the current environment. It must be expected that some of the immediate operational strength of these companies stems from unnaturally skewed demand and therefore might be expected to moderate post the pandemic. However, we believe the lasting impact is likely to be that the services provided by these companies go from being perceived merely as alternatives to a more scalable, future-proofed way forward.

In the Interim Report we discussed the purchases of LiveRamp, EverQuote, Huya, Tabula Rasa HealthCare, ShockWave Medical and Graphcore. New purchases in the second half of the Company's financial year comprised Sutro Biopharma, Q2 Holdings, Agora, Berkeley Lights, Cloudera, LivePerson, American Superconductor, Everbridge and Epic Games.



Sutro Biopharma has developed a novel cell-free protein synthesis technology. This represents a much more scalable approach than traditional cell cultures techniques and allows unprecedented precision in protein design and structure. It makes it possible to design and rapidly produce novel proteins with optimal therapeutic efficacy and stable, predictable pharmacokinetic features. Sutro is looking to commercialise the technology by developing drugs for the treatment of cancer patients, both through partnerships with large pharmaceutical companies and on its own.

Q2 Holdings sells cloud-based virtual banking software to regional banks and credit unions in the US. Its product portfolio is geared toward a bank's front-end operations, for example online access for account holders, voice messaging, mobile banking, bill payments, etc. Its aim is to help small regional banks compete with larger national banks by providing them with access to up-to-date technology. This is critical as banking is increasingly becoming digital. We see significant opportunity for Q2 Holdings to take share amongst the fragmented base of regional banks backed by a strong structural driver of digitisation within customer aspects of banks.

Agora Inc (ADR) is a Chinese company that provides a real-time engagement platform to application developers allowing them to easily embed high quality video-based communication in their applications (eg. apps focused on gaming, education or telemedicine). Through working with many of the leading Chinese app developers, Agora has built significant mindshare within its core market, increasingly this translates to much faster development cycles as it can refine the product with high volume real-world data and not be heavily dependent upon simulated scenarios.

Berkeley Lights develops equipment that enables the precise control and characterisation of single cells. Its technology is based on using light to control the movements of fluid and cells on a semiconductor chip. This has the potential to simplify researchers' workflow, speed up experiments and generate more insights. Berkeley Lights is focusing on commercialising the equipment for the antibody and synthetic biology markets. Longer-term we see an opportunity for the technology to be used in cell therapy application which could markedly expand its end market potential.

Cloudera sells software which helps businesses store, manage and analyse their increasingly large and complex datasets. Over a year ago Cloudera merged with its only direct competitor, leaving the combined entity in a much stronger position. Product innovation has meaningfully accelerated since then and the company launched a range of new offerings which allow customers to manage, analyse and interface with data across any environment (on premise or in the cloud, public or private) with a single security and governance framework that persists across the entire environment. The ease of use of the updated software and the operational and economic benefits combine into an interesting value proposition for both existing and new customers.

LivePerson is a software business focused on messaging-based communication between businesses and their customers. Asynchronous messaging is emerging as the preferred communication method for many consumers and is enabling businesses to increasingly move their customer service function away from inefficient and costly call centres. Through offering a high degree of functionality and interoperability with other systems,



alongside the inherent simplicity of short form communication, LivePerson has an interesting opportunity to use Machine Learning to try and automate a significant portion of customer-initiated messaging communications. This should drive further efficiency gains for its customers and increasingly opens opportunities for messaging to move closer to the transaction and not just being a customer service tool.

American Superconductor specialises in the design and manufacture of power systems and superconducting wire. Whilst the company has had mixed fortunes operating in the wind turbine industry over the past decade, consistent investment in R&D has laid the ground for sizeable new opportunities to emerge in naval power systems and renewable grid infrastructure.

Everbridge is a software company that helps its customers to automate their responses to critical events in order to keep their employees and assets safe plus minimise disruption. The company's early focus was on population alerting in critical events such as a weather emergency or an earthquake. It has capitalised on its success in this area through broadening its offering and building deeper data links into customers. As such the company now offers a suite of tools that help an organisation understand critical situational awareness across both its people, facilities, inventory, supply chain and IT operations. With many businesses and institutions placing greater strategic emphasis on operational resilience we think Everbridge is uniquely positioned and that its offering will increasingly be viewed as essential.

Epic Games, under the leadership of founder Tim Sweeney, has adapted to and often driven important games industry shifts that have occurred since the business was founded in the 1990s. It is the studio behind Fortnite and as the developer of the Unreal Engine, the industry's largest third party game engine, it offers the tool set that enables more and higher quality games to be made. In addition, Epic Store is changing how consumers buy games and offers better incentives to developers. Each of these businesses offer great investment opportunities in their own right, but together they may be the foundations upon which large changes in video game consumption, development and distribution are built.

We are excited about these additions to the portfolio and look forward to observing how these companies evolve over the coming years.

Investment Philosophy

Most small businesses are destined to stay small given their limited scope for both structural growth and meaningful differentiation. Such businesses constitute the bulk of the smaller companies' universe yet are of no appeal to us. However, what is intriguing about the smaller companies' universe is that it contains a subset of immature but potentially high growth companies. By identifying attractive growth companies earlier we seek to benefit from growth at an earlier stage in a company's lifecycle and retain ownership of successful companies as they grow and thrive; we see our role as investing in what are potentially the larger companies of the future as opposed to the smaller companies of today.



We are looking to concentrate on the part of the market where we believe our analytical effort and the pursuit of genuinely transformational growth can be better exploited. The focus at time of initial investment is on younger, more immature companies that are global and exhibiting strong growth.

It is important to remember that big successful ideas typically start out as small, tentative and unproven. Early iterations are easy to dismiss as unworkable but experimentation with, and evolution of, an initially raw concept can, over time, yield huge commercial relevance. Our philosophy involves weighing up what is proven and tangible alongside what has promise and long term potential. Integral to this approach is recognising the role of innovation in business development; it provides the fuel for business creation, growth and long term competitive differentiation. Consequently, identifying companies that value innovation, having both a cultural acceptance of it and a means to develop commercial opportunities around it, is fundamental to our investment approach.

Growth companies, especially those which are young and hard to model, are difficult businesses to value. The wide range of potential outcomes and profitability that is heavily skewed to future years is a combination of uncertainties that many investors struggle with. We do not have all the answers but by approaching the challenge with a genuine long term perspective, accepting a degree of uncertainty, backing robust innovation and entrepreneurial management, we believe we are well positioned to identify the smaller businesses most likely to shape the world in which we live. As technological advancements encroach into an increasing pool of opportunity, the rate and extent of growth that a small business can achieve, in a relatively short period of time, is almost unrecognisable to that of a few years ago. Innovative smaller businesses that are unburdened by the legacy of historic business practices, or those willing to adapt to change, are best positioned to harness this opportunity.

Baillie Gifford Statement on Stewardship

Reclaiming Activism for Long-Term Investors

Baillie Gifford's over-arching ethos is that we are 'actual' investors. We have a responsibility to behave as supportive and constructively engaged long-term investors. We invest in companies at different stages in their evolution, across vastly different industries and geographies and we celebrate their uniqueness. Consequently, we are wary of prescriptive policies and rules, believing that these often run counter to thoughtful and beneficial corporate stewardship. Our approach favours a small number of simple principles which help shape our interactions with companies.

Our Stewardship Principles

Prioritisation of long-term value creation

We encourage company management and their boards to be ambitious and focus their investments on long-term value creation. We understand that it is easy for businesses to be influenced by short-sighted demands for profit maximisation but believe these often lead to sub-optimal long-term outcomes. We regard it as our responsibility to steer businesses away from destructive financial engineering towards activities that create genuine economic value over the long run. We are happy that our value will often be in supporting management when others do not.

A constructive and purposeful board

We believe that boards play a key role in supporting corporate success and representing the interests of minority shareholders. There is no fixed formula, but it is our expectation that boards have the resources, cognitive diversity and information they need to fulfil these responsibilities. We believe that a board works best when there is strong independent representation able to assist, advise and constructively test the thinking of management.

Long-term focused remuneration with stretching targets

We look for remuneration policies that are simple, transparent and reward superior strategic and operational endeavour. We believe incentive schemes can be important in driving behaviour, and we encourage policies which create alignment with genuine long-term shareholders. We are accepting of significant pay-outs to executives if these are commensurate with outstanding long-run value creation, but plans should not reward mediocre outcomes. We think that performance hurdles should be skewed towards long-term results and that remuneration plans should be subject to shareholder approval.

Fair treatment of stakeholders

We believe it is in the long-term interests of companies to maintain strong relationships with all stakeholders, treating employees, customers, suppliers, governments and regulators in a fair and transparent manner. We do not believe in one-size-fits-all governance and we recognise that different shareholder structures are appropriate for different businesses. However, regardless of structure, companies must always respect the rights of all equity owners.

Sustainable business practices

We look for companies to act as responsible corporate citizens, working within the spirit and not just the letter of the laws and regulations that govern them. We believe that corporate success will only be sustained if a business's long-run impact on society and the environment is taken into account. Management and boards should therefore understand and regularly review this aspect of their activities, disclosing such information publicly alongside plans for ongoing improvement.





Sectoral 2020 (2019)





She was also previously Head of Pan-European Equity Sales at Paribas. She is a non-executive director of The Mercantile Investment Trust plc and group chief operating officer of Brunswick Group.



Donald Cameron was appointed a Director on 2 December 2010 and is Chairman of the Audit and Management Engagement Committee. He is an advocate at the Scottish Bar (non-practising) and is also a qualified barrister in England and Wales. He was elected a Member of the Scottish Parliament in 2016. He is a non-executive director of Murray Income Trust PLC.



Caroline Roxburgh was appointed a Director on 1 February 2020. She is a qualified Chartered Accountant and was a partner at PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP until 2016. She is a non-executive director and chair of the audit committee of Montanaro European Smaller Companies Trust plc, a non-executive director and chair of the audit and risk committee of Edinburgh International Festival Society, a non-executive director of the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland and a publicly appointed member of the board of directors and chair of the audit and risk committee of VisitScotland.



William Ducas was appointed a Director on 22 March 2002 and is the Senior Independent Director. He is a member of the board of the Weir Foundation charitable trust and is on the International Advisory Board of Zamorano University. He was previously a director of West LB Mellon Asset Management and a managing director of F&C Management Ltd of North America.



Jonathan Simpson-Dent was appointed a Director on

1 February 2020. He has spent the majority of his career running entrepreneurial Private Equity and listed mid-cap international growth businesses across multiple sectors, being a former CEO of Evander Group, Cardpoint and WLT (EMEA), CCO of Cardtronics Inc and CFO of HomeServe Plc and General Healthcare Group. He has also previously worked at PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP, McKinsey & Company and PepsiCo. He is the Chair of Bromford Housing Group Ltd and a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants.



Mungo Wilson was appointed a Director on 8 December 2016. He is a former solicitor and is Associate Professor of Finance at Saïd Business School, University of Oxford. He is also an associate member of the Oxford Man Institute of Quantitative Finance.

All the Directors are members of the Nomination Committee and all the Directors, with the exception of Mr WJ Ducas, are members of the Audit and Management Engagement Committees. Mr WJ Ducas stepped down from the Audit and Management Engagement Committee on 20 September 2017.

Managers and Secretaries

The Company has appointed Baillie Gifford & Co Limited, a wholly owned subsidiary of Baillie Gifford & Co, as its Alternative Investment Fund Manager and Company Secretaries. Baillie Gifford & Co Limited has delegated portfolio management services to Baillie Gifford & Co. Dealing activity and transaction reporting have been further sub-delegated to Baillie Gifford Overseas Limited and Baillie Gifford Asia (Hong Kong) Limited. Baillie Gifford & Co is an investment management firm formed in 1927 out of the legal firm Baillie & Gifford, WS, which had been involved in investment management since 1908.

Baillie Gifford is one of the largest investment trust managers in the UK and currently manages eleven investment trusts. Baillie Gifford also manages a listed investment company and open ended investment companies, together with investment portfolios on behalf of pension funds, charities and other institutional clients, both in the UK and overseas. Funds under the management or advice of Baillie Gifford totalled over £285 billion at 31 October 2020. Based in Edinburgh, it is one of the leading privately owned investment management firms in the UK, with 46 partners and a staff of around 1,400.

Douglas Brodie is the portfolio manager. He joined Baillie Gifford in 2001 and is Head of the Global Discovery Team, which focuses on the opportunities of smaller companies. Svetlana Viteva and Luke Ward are the deputy portfolio managers. Both joined Baillie Gifford in 2012 and work closely with Douglas Brodie as part of Baillie Gifford's Global Discovery investment desk, from which Edinburgh Worldwide is managed.

Baillie Gifford & Co Limited and Baillie Gifford & Co are both authorised and regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority.

Directors' Report

The Directors present their Report together with the Financial Statements of the Company for the year to 31 October 2020.

Corporate Governance

The Corporate Governance Report is set out on pages 29 to 32 and forms part of this Report.

Managers and Company Secretaries

Baillie Gifford & Co Limited, a wholly owned subsidiary of Baillie Gifford & Co, has been appointed as the Company's Alternative Investment Fund Manager ('AIFM') and Company Secretaries. Baillie Gifford & Co Limited has delegated portfolio management services to Baillie Gifford & Co. Dealing activity and transaction reporting have been further sub-delegated to Baillie Gifford Overseas Limited and Baillie Gifford Asia (Hong Kong) Limited.

The Investment Management Agreement between the AIFM and the Company sets out the matters over which the Managers have authority in accordance with the policies and directions of, and subject to restrictions imposed by, the Board. The Investment Management Agreement is terminable on not less than three months' notice. Compensation fees would only be payable in respect of the notice period if termination by the Company were to occur within a shorter notice period.

With effect from 1 January 2019 the annual management fee is 0.75% on the first $\pounds50$ million of net assets, 0.65% on the next $\pounds200$ million of net assets and 0.55% on the remaining net assets. Prior to 1 January 2019 the fee was 0.95% on the first $\pounds50$ million of net assets, 0.65% on the next $\pounds200$ million of net assets and 0.55% on the remaining net assets. Management fees are calculated and payable quarterly. The Board is of the view that calculating the fee with reference to performance would be unlikely to exert a positive influence on performance.

The Board considers the Company's investment management and secretarial arrangements on a continuing basis and a formal review is conducted by the Audit and Management Engagement Committee annually. The Committee considered the following topics amongst others in its review:

- investment process;
- investment performance;
- the quality of the personnel assigned to handle the Company's affairs;
- developments at the Managers, including staff turnover;
- the administrative services provided by the Secretaries;
- share price and discount; and
- charges and fees.

Following the most recent review the Audit and Management Engagement Committee concluded that the continuing appointment of Baillie Gifford & Co Limited as AIFM and Secretaries, the delegation of the investment management services to Baillie Gifford & Co and the further sub-delegation of dealing activity and transaction reporting to Baillie Gifford Overseas Limited and Baillie Gifford Asia (Hong Kong) Limited, on the terms agreed, is in the interests of the Company and the shareholders as a whole. This was subsequently approved by the Board.

Depositary

In accordance with the Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive, the AIFM must appoint a Depositary to the Company. The Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited has been appointed as the Company's Depository.

The Depositary's responsibilities include cash monitoring, safe keeping of the Company's financial instruments, verifying ownership and maintaining a record of other assets and monitoring the Company's compliance with investment limits and leverage requirements. The custody function is also undertaken by The Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited ('the Custodian').

Directors

Information about the Directors who were in office during the year and up to the date the Financial Statements were signed including their relevant experience can be found on pages 23 and 24.

In accordance with the AIC Code of Corporate Governance issued in February 2019, the Board has agreed that all Directors will offer themselves for re-election by shareholders on an annual basis. As a result, all Directors, will retire at this year's Annual General Meeting and will offer themselves for re-election or, in the case of Ms CA Roxburgh and Mr JA Simpson-Dent who were appointed on 1 February 2020, election.

Following formal performance evaluation, the Board concluded that the performance of each of the Directors continues to be effective and that they remain committed to the Company. Their contribution to the Board is greatly valued and the Board recommends their re-election to shareholders.

The Board also considers that Mr DAJ Cameron, Mr WJ Ducas and Ms H James all remain independent having served on the Board for more than nine years, as explained on page 29.

Director Indemnification and Insurance

The Company has entered into qualifying third party deeds of indemnity in favour of each of its Directors. The deeds, which were in force during the year to 31 October 2020 and up to the date of approval of this Report, cover any liabilities that may arise to a third party, other than the Company, for negligence, default or breach of trust or duty. The Directors are not indemnified in respect of liabilities to the Company, any regulatory or criminal fines, any costs incurred in connection with criminal proceedings in which the Director is convicted or civil proceedings brought by the Company in which judgement is given against him/her. In addition, the indemnity does not apply to any liability to the extent that it is recovered from another person.

The Company maintains Directors' and Officers' liability insurance.

Conflicts of Interest

Each Director submits a list of potential conflicts of interest to the Nomination Committee on an annual basis. The Committee considers these carefully, taking into account the circumstances surrounding them and makes a recommendation to the Board on whether or not the potential conflicts should be authorised. Board authorisation is for a period of one year.

Having considered the lists of potential conflicts there were no situations which gave rise to a direct or indirect interest of a Director which conflicted with the interests of the Company.

Dividends

The Company's objective is that of generating capital growth. Consequently, the Managers do not invest in companies based on the level of income they may payout as dividends.

As highlighted previously, the Board does not intend to draw on the Company's revenue reserve to pay or maintain dividends. This year the net revenue return per share was a deficit of $\mathfrak{L}1,479,000$. There is no requirement under section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 to pay a dividend as the net revenue return is below the level which would trigger the requirement to pay a dividend hence the Board is recommending that no final dividend be paid. Should the level of underlying income increase in future years, the Board will seek to distribute the minimum permissible to maintain investment trust status by way of a final dividend.

Share Capital

Capital Structure

The Company's capital structure as at 31 October 2020 consists of 354,318,695 ordinary shares of 1p each (2019 – 302,598,695 ordinary shares of 1p each), see note 11. There are no restrictions concerning the holding or transfer of the Company's ordinary shares and there are no special rights attached to any of the shares.

Following a five for one share split on 28 January 2019, each ordinary share of 5p was replaced with five new ordinary shares of 1p each.

Dividends

The ordinary shares carry a right to receive dividends. Interim dividends are determined by the Directors, whereas any proposed final dividend is subject to shareholder approval.

Capital Entitlement

On a winding up, after meeting the liabilities of the Company, the surplus assets will be paid to ordinary shareholders in proportion to their shareholdings.

Voting

Each ordinary shareholder present in person or by proxy is entitled to one vote on a show of hands and, on a poll, to one vote for every share held.

Major Interests Disclosed in the Company's Shares

There are no major interest disclosed in the Company's shares as at 31 October 2020 and there have been no disclosed changes to the major interests in the Company's shares intimated up to 8 December 2020.

Annual General Meeting

The details of this year's Annual General Meeting, including the proposed resolutions and information on the deadlines for proxy appointments, can be found on pages 65 and 67. Shareholders who hold shares in their own name on the main register will be provided with a Form of Proxy and there are also special arrangements for holders of shares through the Aberdeen Standard Investments Share Plan, Individual Savings Account and

Investment Plan for Children who are provided with a Form of Direction. If you hold shares through a share platform or other nominee, the Board would encourage you to contact these organisations directly as soon as possible to arrange for you to attend and/or vote at the Annual General Meeting. The resolutions relating to the renewal of the Directors' authorities to issue and buy back shares are explained in more detail below.

Issuance of Shares

At the last Annual General Meeting, the Directors were granted shareholders' approval for a general authority to issue shares, up to £998,575.69, being approximately 33% of the nominal value of the Company's issued ordinary share capital as at 4 December 2019, and also an authority to issue shares or sell shares held in treasury for cash on a non pre-emptive basis, up to £302,598.69, representing approximately 10% of the nominal value of the issued share capital of the Company as at 4 December 2019 (without first offering such shares to existing shareholders pro-rata to their existing holdings).

Following strong demand for the Company's shares, the Company held a General Meeting on 16 July 2020 (the 'July General Meeting') and a special resolution was passed giving the Directors further authority to issue or sell shares held in treasury for cash on a non pre-emptive basis, up to £325,938.69, representing approximately 10% of the nominal value of the issued share capital of the Company as at 18 June 2020. This authority will expire at the Annual General Meeting.

The demand for the Company's shares continued and the Board was conscious that the Company's shareholders authorities, noted above, may prove insufficient to allow them to continue to satisfy the continued demand for the Company's shares and therefore convened another General Meeting on 14 October 2020 (the 'October General Meeting') at which shareholders granted the Directors further authorities to issue or sell shares held in treasury for cash on a non pre-emptive basis, in aggregate, up to £692,537.38 representing, in aggregate, approximately 20% of the issued share capital of the Company as at 16 September 2020. As a result of the Company's rate of issuance and in accordance with the Prospectus Regulation Rules, the Company published a prospectus on 14 October 2020 (the 'Prospectus') to allow it to continue with its share issuance programme. The authorities granted by shareholders at the October General Meeting are not due to expire until the expiry of the Prospectus which, at the latest, would be on 14 October 2021.

During the year to 31 October 2020 the Company has issued a total of 51,720,000 shares on a non pre-emptive basis (nominal value of £517,000, representing 17.1% of the issued share capital at 31 October 2019) at a premium to net asset value (on the basis of debt valued at book value) on 101 separate occasions at weighted average price of 258.03p per share raising net proceeds of £133,044,000.

Between 1 November 2020 and 8 December 2020 the Company issued a further 9,850,000 shares at a premium to net asset value raising net proceeds of £30,501,000.

In order to ensure that it continues to have sufficient capacity to satisfy demand for the Company's shares, the Directors are proposing to seek shareholders' approval to renew the Company's annual allotment and disapplication of pre-emption right authorities for a further year, as detailed below in addition to the authorities granted at the October General Meeting.

Resolution 12 in the Notice of Annual General Meeting therefore seeks a general authority for the Directors to issue ordinary shares up to an aggregate nominal amount of $\mathfrak{L}1,201,756.69$ in addition to the Company's existing authority. This amount represents approximately 33% of the Company's total ordinary share capital in issue at 8 December 2020, being the latest practicable date prior to the publication of this document, and meets institutional guidelines. No issue of ordinary shares will be made pursuant to the authorisation in Resolution 12 which would effectively alter the control of the Company without the prior approval of shareholders in general meeting.

Resolution 13, which is being proposed as a special resolution, seeks to renew the Directors' authority to allot equity securities, or sell treasury shares, for cash without having to offer such shares to existing shareholders pro-rata to their existing holdings, up to a total nominal amount of £364,168.69, representing approximately 10% of the Company's total issued ordinary share capital as at 8 December 2020, being the latest practicable date prior to publication of this document. This authority would be in addition to the Company's existing authority.

The Directors consider that the authorities proposed to be granted by Resolutions 12 and 13 continue to be advantageous when the Company's shares trade at a premium to net asset value and the level of natural liquidity in the market is unable to meet demand. These authorities, in addition to the Company's existing authorities granted at the October General Meeting will also allow the Directors to continue with the share issuance programme as set out in the Prospectus. The Directors do not intend to use this authority to sell or issue ordinary shares on a non pre-emptive basis at a discount to net asset value. While the level of the authority being sought is greater than the 5% recommended by the Pre-Emption Group in their Statement of Principles on disapplying pre-emption rights, it is specifically recognised in the Statement of Principles that, where an investment trust is seeking authority to issue shares at a premium to the underlying net asset value per share, this should not normally raise concerns and the Directors consider the greater flexibility provided by this authority to be justified in the circumstances.

The authorities sought in Resolutions 12 and 13 will continue until the conclusion of the Annual General Meeting to be held in 2022 or on the expiry of 15 months from the passing of the resolutions, if earlier.

Such authorities will only be used to issue shares or sell shares from treasury at a premium to net asset value and only when the Directors believe that it would be in the best interests of the Company to do so. The Directors believe that the ability to buy-back shares at a discount and re-sell them or issue new shares at a premium are useful tools in smoothing supply and demand.

No shares were held in treasury as at 8 December 2020.

Market Purchases of Shares by the Company

At the last Annual General Meeting the Company was granted authority to purchase up to 45,359,544 ordinary shares (equivalent to approximately 14.99% of its issued share capital as at 4 December 2019). This authority expires at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting. No shares were bought back during the year under review and no shares are held in treasury.

Share buy-backs may be made principally:

- (i) to enhance net asset value for continuing shareholders by purchasing shares at a discount to the prevailing net asset value; and
- (ii) to address any imbalance between the supply of and the demand for the Company's shares that results in a discount of the quoted market price to the published net asset value per share.

The Company may hold bought back shares in treasury and then:

- (i) sell such shares (or any of them) for cash (or its equivalent under the Companies Act 2006); or
- (ii) cancel the shares (or any of them).

Shares will only be re-sold from treasury at a premium to net asset value per ordinary share.

Treasury shares do not receive distributions and the Company is not entitled to exercise voting rights attaching to them.

The Directors are seeking shareholders' approval at the Annual General Meeting to renew the authority to purchase up to 54,588,887 ordinary shares in issue (excluding treasury shares) as at 8 December 2020, being the latest practicable date prior to the publication of this document (or, if less, the number representing approximately 14.99% of the Company's ordinary shares in issue (excluding treasury shares) at the date of passing of the resolution, such authority to expire at the Annual General Meeting of the Company to be held in 2022.

In accordance with the Listing Rules, the maximum price (excluding expenses) that may be paid on the exercise of the authority must not exceed the higher of:

- (i) 5% above the average closing price on the London Stock Exchange of an ordinary share over the five business days immediately preceding the date of purchase; and
- (ii) the higher of the price of the last independent trade and the highest current independent bid as stipulated by Article 5(1) of Commission Regulation (EC) 22 December 2003 implementing the Market Abuse Directive as regards exemptions for buy back programmes and stabilisation of financial instruments (No. 2273/2003).

The minimum price (exclusive of expenses) that may be paid will be the nominal value of an ordinary share. Purchases of shares will be made within guidelines established, from time to time, by the Board. Your attention is drawn to Resolution 14 in the Notice of Annual General Meeting.

Recommendation

The Directors consider each resolution being proposed at the Annual General Meeting to be in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders as a whole and they unanimously recommend that all shareholders vote in favour of them, as they intend to do where possible in respect of their own beneficial shareholdings.

Financial Instruments

The Company's financial instruments comprise its investment portfolio, cash balances, bank borrowings and debtors and creditors that arise directly from its operations such as sales and purchases awaiting settlement and accrued income. The financial risk management objectives and policies arising from its financial instruments and the exposure of the Company to risk are disclosed in note 16 to the Financial Statements.

Future Developments of the Company

The outlook for the Company for the next 12 months is set out in the Chairman's Statement on pages 2 to 4 and the Managers' Review on pages 12 to 14.

Articles of Association

The Company's Articles of Association may only be amended by special resolution at a general meeting of shareholders.

Disclosure of Information to Auditor

The Directors confirm that so far as each of the Directors is aware there is no relevant audit information of which the Company's Auditor is unaware and the Directors have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as Directors in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the Company's Auditor is aware of that information.

Independent Auditor

The Auditor, Ernst & Young LLP, is willing to continue in office and in accordance with section 489 and section 491(1) of the Companies Act 2006, resolutions concerning Ernst & Young LLP's reappointment and remuneration will be submitted to the Annual General Meeting.

Post Balance Sheet Events

The Directors confirm that there have been no post Balance Sheet events which require adjustment of, or disclosure in, the Financial Statements or notes thereto up to 9 December 2020.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Streamlined Energy and Carbon Report ('SECR')

All of the Company's activities are outsourced to third parties. The Company therefore has no greenhouse gas emissions to report from its operations, nor does it have responsibility for any other emissions producing sources under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Reports) Regulations 2013. For the same reasons as set out above, the Company is a low energy user under the SECR regulations and has no energy and carbon information to disclose.

Bribery Act

The Company has a zero tolerance policy towards bribery and is committed to carrying out business fairly, honestly and openly. The Managers also adopt a zero tolerance approach and have policies and procedures in place to prevent bribery.

Criminal Finances Act 2017

The Company has a commitment to zero tolerance towards the criminal facilitation of tax evasion.

Corporate Governance Report

The Board is committed to achieving and demonstrating high standards of Corporate Governance. This statement outlines how the principles of the 2018 UK Corporate Governance Code (the 'Code') which can be found at www.frc.org.uk and the principles of the Association of Investment Companies Code of Corporate Governance (the 'AIC Code' issued in 2019) were applied throughout the financial year. The AIC Code provides a framework of best practice for investment companies and can be found at www.theaic.co.uk.

Compliance

The Board confirms that the Company has complied throughout the year under review with the relevant provisions of the Code and the recommendations of the AIC Code. The Code includes provisions relating to the role of the chief executive, executive directors' remuneration and the need for an internal audit function. Given that the Company is an externally managed investment trust, the Board considers these provisions are not relevant to the Company (the need for an internal audit function specific to the Company has been addressed on page 33).

The FRC has confirmed that AIC member companies who report against the AIC Code will be meeting their obligations in relation to the UK Code.

The Board

The Board has overall responsibility for the Company's affairs. It has a number of matters formally reserved for its approval including strategy, investment policy, currency hedging, gearing, treasury matters, dividend and corporate governance policy. A separate strategy session is held annually. The Board also reviews the Financial Statements, investment transactions, revenue budgets and performance of the Company. Full and timely information is provided to the Board to enable the Board to function effectively and to allow Directors to discharge their responsibilities.

The Board comprises seven Directors all of whom are non-executive.

The Chairman, Mr HCT Strutt, is responsible for organising the business of the Board, ensuring its effectiveness and setting its agenda.

The executive responsibilities for investment management have been delegated to the Company's Alternative Investment Fund Manager ('AIFM'), Baillie Gifford & Co Limited, and in the context of a Board comprising entirely non-executive Directors, there is no chief executive officer. Mr WJ Ducas is the Senior Independent Director.

The Directors believe that the Board has a balance of skills and experience which enable it to provide effective strategic leadership and proper governance of the Company. Information about the Directors, including their relevant experience, can be found on pages 23 and 24.

There is an agreed procedure for Directors to seek independent professional advice if necessary at the Company's expense. No such advice was sought in the year to 31 October 2020 or 31 October 2019.

Appointments

The terms and conditions of Directors' appointments are set out in formal letters of appointment which are available for inspection on request.

Under the provisions of the Company's Articles of Association, a Director appointed during the year is required to retire and seek election by shareholders at the next Annual General Meeting. In accordance with the principals of the AIC Code all Directors will offer themselves for re-election annually.

The reasons why the Board supports the re-elections are set out on page 25.

Directors are not entitled to any termination payments in relation to their appointment.

Chairperson and Directors' Tenure

The Nomination Committee has considered the question of tenure for Directors and has concluded that there should not be a set maximum time limit for a Director or Chairperson to serve on the Board. The Nomination Committee keeps under review the balance of skills, knowledge, experience, performance and length of service of the Directors ensuring the Board has the appropriate combination of skills and Company knowledge and experience. This is balanced against the appointment of new Directors having fresh ideas and perspective.

Independence of Directors

All of the Directors are considered by the Board to be independent of the Managers and free of any business or other relationship which could interfere with the exercise of their independent judgement.

The Directors recognise the importance of succession planning for company boards and review the Board composition annually. The Board is of the view that length of service will not necessarily compromise the independence or contribution of Directors of an investment trust company, where continuity and experience can be a benefit to the Board. The Board concurs with the view expressed in the AIC Code that long serving Directors should not be prevented from being considered independent.

Mr DAJ Cameron, Mr WJ Ducas and Ms H James, have all served on the Board for more than nine years. All Directors offer themselves for re-election annually. Following formal performance evaluation the Board considers that Mr DAJ Cameron, Mr WJ Ducas and Ms H James continue to be independent in character and judgement and their skills and experience were a significant benefit to the Board.

Meetings

There is an annual cycle of Board meetings which is designed to address, in a systematic way, overall strategy, review of investment policy, investment performance, marketing, revenue budgets, dividend policy and communication with shareholders. The Board considers that it meets sufficiently regularly to discharge its duties effectively. The following table shows the attendance record for the Board and Committee Meetings held during the year, excluding ancillary and sub-committee meetings. The Annual General Meeting was attended by all the Directors in office as at 22 January 2020.

Nomination Committee

The Nomination Committee consists of the whole Board and the Chairman of the Board is Chairman of the Committee except when the Committee is dealing with the matter of succession to the Chairmanship of the Company. The Committee meets on an annual basis and at such other times as may be required. The Committee has written terms of reference which include reviewing the composition of the Board, identifying and nominating new candidates for appointment to the Board, Board appraisal, succession planning and training. The Committee also considers whether Directors should be recommended for re-election by shareholders. The Committee is responsible for considering Directors' potential conflicts of interest and for making recommendations to the Board on whether or not the potential conflicts should be authorised.

The Committee's terms of reference are available on request from the Company and on the Company's page on the Managers' website: **www.edinburghworldwide.co.uk**.

Board Diversity

The Board recognises the benefits of diversity, and the Company's policy on diversity is referred to in the Strategic Report. The Board's priority in appointing new Directors to the Board is to identify candidates with the best range of skills and experience to complement existing Directors. The Board will not display any bias for age, gender, race, sexual orientation, religion, ethnic or national origins, or disability in considering the appointment of its Directors. However, it is the Board's policy to ensure that all appointments are made on the basis of merit against the specification prepared for each appointment. Accordingly the Board does not consider it appropriate to set diversity targets.

Board Composition

In order to fulfil its obligations, the Board recognises the importance of having a range of skilled and experienced Directors, balancing the benefits of length of service and knowledge of the Company with the desirability of ensuring regular refreshment of the Board. The Board reviews its composition annually. As reported last year, the Nomination

Committee commissioned a search to find two new independent non-executive Directors using the services of Nurole Limited, an executive search firm which has no other connection with the Company or its Directors. The Directors drew up specifications for these appointments and interviewed a shortlist of suitable candidates. Following this process the Board appointed Ms Caroline Roxburgh and Mr Jonathan Simpson-Dent as Directors with effect from 1 February 2020.

It was also reported last year that Mr William Ducas intended to retire from the Board in 2020. Unfortunately, due to the restrictions imposed by Covid-19, the Board has been unable to meet face-to-face following the appointment of the two new Directors. In these circumstances the Board decided that, in the interests of continuity, it would be desirable for Mr Ducas to remain on the Board until such time as it is possible to resume face-to-face meetings. Accordingly it is intended that Mr Ducas will retire from the Board by the end of June 2021.

Performance Evaluation

As was also reported last year, the Board intended to engage an independent facilitation company to conduct an external Board evaluation in 2020. While the Board has agreed preliminary terms of engagement with an independent facilitation company, it has been decided to defer this evaluation until such time as the Board, including the newly appointed Directors, has been able to meet on a face-to-face basis.

The appraisals and evaluations considered, amongst other criteria, the balance of skills of the Board, training and development requirements, the contribution of individual Directors and the overall effectiveness of the Board and its Committees. Following this process it was concluded that the performance of each Director, the Chairman, the Board and its Committees continues to be effective and each Director and the Chairman remain committed to the Company.

A review of the Chairman's and other Directors' commitments was carried out and the Nomination Committee is satisfied that they are capable of devoting sufficient time to the Company. There were no significant changes to the Chairman's other commitments during the year.

Induction and Training

New Directors are provided with an induction programme which is tailored to the particular circumstances of the appointee. During the year briefings on industry and regulatory matters were provided to the Board by the Managers and Secretaries. Directors receive other relevant training as necessary.

Remuneration

As all the Directors are non-executive, there is no requirement for a separate Remuneration Committee. Directors' fees are considered by the Board as a whole within the limits approved by shareholders. The Company's policy on remuneration is set out in the Directors' Remuneration Report on page 35.

Audit and Management Engagement Committee

The report of the Audit and Management Engagement Committee is set out on pages 33 and 34.

Internal Controls and Risk Management

The Directors acknowledge their responsibility for the Company's risk management and internal controls systems and for reviewing their effectiveness. The systems are designed to manage rather than eliminate the risk of failure to achieve business objectives and can only provide reasonable but not absolute assurance against material misstatement or loss.

The Board confirms that there is a continuing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the significant risks faced by the Company in accordance with the FRC guidance 'Guidance on Risk Management, Internal Control and Related Financial and Business Reporting'.

The practical measures in relation to the design, implementation and maintenance of control policies and procedures to safeguard the Company's assets and to manage its affairs properly, including the maintenance of effective operational and compliance controls have been delegated to the Managers and Secretaries.

The Board oversees the functions delegated to the Managers and Secretaries and the controls managed by the AIFM in accordance with the Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive (as detailed below). Baillie Gifford & Co's Internal Audit and Compliance Departments and the AIFM's permanent risk function provide the Audit and Management Engagement Committee with regular reports on their monitoring programmes. The reporting procedures for these departments are defined and formalised within a service level agreement. Baillie Gifford & Co conducts an annual review of its system of internal controls which is documented within an internal controls report which complies with ISAE 3402 and Technical Release AAF 01/06 - Assurance Reports on Internal Controls of Service Organisations made available to Third Parties. This report is independently reviewed by Baillie Gifford & Co's Auditor and a copy is submitted to the Audit and Management Engagement Committee.

A report identifying the material risks faced by the Company and the key controls employed to manage these risks is reviewed by the Audit and Management Engagement Committee.

These procedures ensure that consideration is given regularly to the nature and extent of risks facing the Company and that they are being actively monitored. Where changes in risk have been identified during the year they also provide a mechanism to assess whether further action is required to manage these risks.

The Directors confirm that they have reviewed the effectiveness of the Company's risk management and internal controls systems which accord with the FRC guidance 'Guidance on Risk Management, Internal Control and Related Financial and Business Reporting' and they have procedures in place to review their effectiveness on a regular basis. No significant weaknesses were identified in the year under review and up to the date of this Report.

The Board confirms that these procedures have been in place throughout the Company's financial year and continue to be in place up to the date of approval of this Report.

To comply with the Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive, The Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited act as the Company's Depositary and Baillie Gifford & Co Limited as its AIFM

The Depositary's responsibilities include cash monitoring, safe keeping of the Company's financial instruments, verifying ownership and maintaining a record of other assets and monitoring the Company's compliance with investment limits and leverage requirements. The Depositary is liable for the loss of financial instruments held in custody. The Depositary will ensure that any delegate segregates the assets of the Company. The Company's Depositary also acts as the Company's Custodian. The Custodian prepares reports on its key controls and safeguards which are independently reviewed by KPMG LLP. The reports are reviewed by Baillie Gifford's Business Risk Department and a summary of the key points is reported to the Audit and Management Engagement Committee and any concerns are investigated.

The Depositary provides the Audit and Management Engagement Committee with a report on its monitoring activities.

The AIFM has established a permanent risk management function to ensure that effective risk management policies and procedures are in place and to monitor compliance with risk limits. The AIFM has a risk management policy which covers the risks associated with the management of the portfolio, and the adequacy and effectiveness of this policy is reviewed and approved at least annually. This review includes the risk management processes and systems and limits for each risk area.

The risk limits, which are set by the AIFM and approved by the Board, take into account the objectives, strategy and risk profile of the portfolio. These limits, including leverage (see note 18 on page 64), are monitored and the sensitivity of the portfolio to key risks is undertaken periodically as appropriate to ascertain the impact of changes in key variables in the portfolio. Exceptions from limits monitoring and stress testing undertaken by Baillie Gifford's Business Risk Department are escalated to the AIFM and reported to the Board along with any remedial measures being taken.

Going Concern

In accordance with the Financial Reporting Council's guidance on going concern and liquidity risk, including its Covid-19 guidance, the Directors have undertaken a rigorous review of the Company's ability to continue as a going concern and specifically in the context of the coronavirus pandemic.

The Company's principal risks are market related and include market risk, liquidity risk and credit risk. An explanation of these risks and how they are managed is set out on pages 8 to 10 and contained in note 16 to the Financial Statements. The Board has, in particular, considered the impact of heightened market volatility since the coronavirus (Covid-19) outbreak but does not believe the Company's going concern status is affected.

The Company's assets, the majority of which are investments in quoted securities which are readily realisable, exceed its liabilities significantly. All borrowings require the prior approval of the Board. Gearing levels and compliance with borrowing covenants are reviewed by the Board on a regular basis. The Company has continued to comply with the investment trust status requirements of section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and the Investment Trust (Approved Company) (Tax) Regulations 2011. The Company's primary third party suppliers, including its Managers and Secretaries, Custodian and Depositary, Registrar, Auditor and Broker, are not experiencing significant operational difficulties affecting their respective services to the Company.

Accordingly, the Financial Statements have been prepared on the going concern basis as it is the Directors' opinion, having assessed the principal and emerging risks and other matters including the impact of the coronavirus outbreak set out in the Viability Statement on page 10 which assesses the prospects of the Company over a period of five years, that the Company will continue in operational existence for a period of at least twelve months from the date of approval of these Financial Statements.

Relations with Shareholders

The Board places great importance on communication with shareholders. The Company's Managers communicate regularly with shareholders and their representatives and report shareholders' views to the Board. The Chairman is available to meet with shareholders as appropriate. Shareholders wishing to communicate with any member of the Board may do so by writing to them at the Company's registered office or through the Company's broker Numis Securities Limited (see contact details on the back cover).

The Company's Annual General Meeting provides a forum for communication with all shareholders. The level of proxies lodged for each resolution is announced at the meeting and is published on the Company's page of the Managers' website www.edinburghworldwide.co.uk subsequent to the meeting.

The notice period for the Annual General Meeting is at least twenty working days.

Shareholders and potential investors may obtain up-to-date information on the Company at **www.edinburghworldwide.co.uk**.

Corporate Governance and Stewardship

The Company has given discretionary voting powers to Baillie Gifford & Co. The Managers vote against resolutions they consider may damage shareholders' rights or economic interests.

The Company believes that it is in the shareholders' interests to consider environmental, social and governance ('ESG') factors when selecting and retaining investments and have asked the Managers to take these issues into account as long as the investment objectives are not compromised. The Managers do not exclude companies from their investment universe purely on the grounds of ESG factors but adopt a positive engagement approach whereby matters are discussed with management with the aim of improving the relevant policies and management systems and enabling the Managers to consider how ESG factors could impact long term investment returns. The Managers' statement of compliance with the UK Stewardship Code can be found on the Managers' website at www.bailliegifford.com. The Managers' policy has been reviewed and endorsed by the Board.

The Managers, Baillie Gifford & Co, are signatories to the United Nations Principles for Responsible Investment and the Carbon Disclosure Project and are also members of the Asian Corporate Governance Association and International Corporate Governance Network.

Audit and Management Engagement Committee Report

The Audit and Management Engagement Committee consists of all independent Directors with the exception of Mr WJ Ducas who stepped down from the Committee on 20 September 2017. With reference to the guidance from the 2019 AIC Code of Corporate Governance it is considered appropriate for Mr HCT Strutt, the Chairman, to be a member of the Audit and Management Engagement Committee as he is a qualified chartered accountant and as such brings significant financial experience to the Committee. The members of the Committee consider that they have the requisite financial skills and experience to fulfil the responsibilities of the Committee. Mr DAJ Cameron is Chairman of the Committee.

The Committee's authority and duties are clearly defined within its written terms of reference which are available on request from the Company Secretaries and at **www.edinburghworldwide.co.uk**. The terms of reference are reviewed annually.

The Committee's effectiveness is reviewed on an annual basis as part of the Board's performance evaluation process.

At least once a year the Committee meets with the external Auditor without any representative of the Managers being present.

Main Activities of the Committee

The Committee met twice during the year, and the external Auditor, Ernst & Young LLP, attended both meetings. Baillie Gifford & Co's Internal Audit and Compliance Departments and the AIFM's permanent risk function provided reports on their monitoring programmes for the meetings.

The matters considered, monitored and reviewed by the Committee during the course of the year included the following:

- the preliminary results announcement and the Annual and Interim Reports;
- the Company's accounting policies and practices;
- the regulatory changes impacting the Company;
- the fairness, balance and understandability of the Annual Report and Financial Statements and provide advice to the Board whether it provided the information necessary for shareholders to assess the Company's performance, business model and strategy;
- the effectiveness of the Company's internal control environment;
- appointment/reappointment, remuneration and terms of engagement of the external Auditor;
- whether the audit services contract should be put out to tender;
- the policy on the engagement of the external Auditor to supply non-audit services;
- the independence and objectivity of the external Auditor and the effectiveness of the external audit process;
- the need for the Company to have its own internal audit function;

- internal controls reports received from the Managers and Custodian;
- the terms of the Investment Management Agreement, as described on page 25 and the continuing appointment of the Managers; and
- the arrangements in place within Baillie Gifford & Co whereby their staff may, in confidence, raise concerns about possible improprieties in matters of financial reporting or other matters.

Internal Audit

The Committee continues to believe that the compliance and internal controls systems and the internal audit function in place within the Investment Managers provide sufficient assurance that a sound system of internal control, which safeguards shareholders' investment and the Company's assets, is maintained. An internal audit function, specific to the Company is therefore considered unnecessary.

Financial Reporting

The Committee considers that the most significant issue likely to affect the Financial Statements is the existence and valuation of investments as they represent 96.3% of total assets and the accuracy and completeness of income from investments.

Unlisted Investments

The Committee reviewed the Managers' valuation approach for investments in unlisted companies (as described on page 49) and approved the value of all unlisted investments at 31 October 2020, following a detailed review of the valuation of each investment and relevant challenge where appropriate.

The Managers agreed the holdings in certificated form to confirmations from the Company's custodian and holdings of uncertificated unlisted investments were agreed to confirmations from the relevant investee companies.

Listed Investments

The majority of the investments are in quoted securities and market prices are readily available from independent external pricing sources. The Committee reviewed the Managers' Report on Internal Controls which details the controls in place regarding recording and pricing of investments and the reconciliation of investment holdings to third party data.

The Managers agreed the prices of all the listed investments at 31 October 2020 to external price sources and the holdings were agreed to confirmations from the Company's Custodian or Transfer Agent.

Other Matters

The Committee reviewed the Managers' Report on Internal Controls which details the controls in place regarding completeness and accurate recording of investment income. The accounting treatment of each special dividend received or receivable during the year are reviewed by the Managers as they arise.

The Committee considered the factors, including the impact of Covid-19, that might affect the Company's viability over a period of five years and its ability to continue as a going concern for at least twelve months from the date of signing of the Financial Statements, together with reports from the Managers on the cash position and cash flow projections of the Company, the liquidity of its investment portfolio, compliance with debt covenants, availability of borrowing facilities, and the Company's ability to meet its obligations as they fall due. The Committee also reviewed the Viability Statement on page 10 and statement on Going Concern on pages 31 and 32 including the potential impact of Covid-19. Following this assessment, the Committee recommended to the Board the appropriateness of the Going Concern basis in preparing the Financial Statements and confirmed the accuracy of the Viability Statement and statement on Going Concern.

The Auditor confirmed to the Committee that the investments at 31 October 2020 had been valued in accordance with the stated accounting policies. The value of all the listed investments had been agreed to external price sources and the portfolio holdings agreed to confirmations from the Company's Custodian.

The Managers and Auditor confirmed to the Committee that they were not aware of any material misstatements in the context of the Financial Statements as a whole and that the Financial Statements are in accordance with applicable law and accounting standards.

Internal Controls and Risk Management

The Committee reviewed the effectiveness of the Company's risk management and internal controls systems as described on page 31. No significant weaknesses were identified in the year under review.

External Auditor

To fulfil its responsibility regarding the independence of the external Auditor, the Committee reviewed:

- the Auditor's audit plan for the current year which includes a report from the Auditor describing their arrangements to manage auditor independence and received confirmation of their independence; and
- the extent of non-audit services provided by the external Auditor. There were no non-audit fees in the year to 31 October 2020. Ernst & Young LLP provide an iXBRL tagging service to the Company. The engagement is with Baillie Gifford & Co and the Company is not recharged for this service. The fee charged for this service was £1,500. Ernst & Young LLP have resigned from these services following the changes to the Ethical Standard with effect from 15 March 2020.

To assess the effectiveness of the external Auditor, the Committee reviewed and considered:

- the Auditor's fulfilment of the agreed audit plan;
- feedback from the Secretaries on the performance of the audit team; and
- the Audit Quality Inspection Report on Ernst & Young LLP issued by the FRC's Audit Quality Review team.

To fulfil its responsibility for oversight of the external audit process the Committee considered and reviewed:

- the Auditor's engagement letter;
- the Auditor's proposed audit strategy;
- the audit fee; and
- a report from the Auditor on the conclusion of the audit.

Ernst & Young LLP were appointed as the Company's Auditor at the Annual General Meeting held on 24 January 2017. The audit partner responsible for the audit is to be rotated at least every five years in accordance with professional and regulatory standards in order to protect independence and objectivity and to provide fresh challenge to the business. The year ending 31 October 2020 is the fourth year out of a maximum of five for the current audit partner, Caroline Mercer.

Ernst & Young LLP have confirmed that they believe they are independent within the meaning of regulatory and professional requirements and that the objectivity of the audit partner and staff is not impaired.

Having carried out the review described above, the Committee is satisfied that the Auditor remains independent and effective for the purposes of this year's audit and, as such, has not considered it necessary to put the audit services contract out to tender.

There are no contractual obligations restricting the Committee's choice of Auditor.

Accountability and Audit

The respective responsibilities of the Directors and the Auditor in connection with the Financial Statements are set out on pages 37 to 43.

Directors' Remuneration Report

This report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Statement by the Chairman

The Directors' Remuneration Policy is subject to shareholder approval every three years or sooner if an alteration to the policy is proposed. The Remuneration Policy which is set out below was last approved at the Annual General Meeting in January 2020 and no changes to the policy are proposed.

The Board reviewed the level of fees during the year and following a review of the Directors' time commitment and the fees paid by comparable trusts it was agreed that, with effect from 1 November 2020, the Chairman's fee would increase from £35,500 to £36,500, the Directors' fees would increase from £24,000 to £25,000 and the additional fee for the Audit and Management Engagement Committee Chairman would increase from £4,500 to £5,000 per annum. The fees were last increased on 1 November 2019.

Directors' Remuneration Policy

The Board is composed wholly of non-executive Directors, none of whom has a service contract with the Company. There is no separate remuneration committee and the Board as a whole considers changes to Directors' fees from time to time. Baillie Gifford & Co Limited, the Company Secretaries, provide comparative information when the Board considers the level of Directors' fees.

The Board's policy is that the remuneration of Directors should be set at a reasonable level that is commensurate with the duties and responsibilities of the role and consistent with the requirement to attract and retain Directors of the appropriate quality and experience. The Board believes that the fees paid to the Directors should reflect the experience of the Board as a whole, be fair and should take account of the level of fees paid by comparable investment trusts. Any views expressed by shareholders on the fees being paid to Directors will be taken into consideration by the Board when reviewing the Board's policy on remuneration.

Non-executive Directors are not eligible for any other remuneration or benefits apart from the reimbursement of allowable expenses. There are no performance conditions relating to Directors' fees and there are no long term incentive schemes or pension schemes. There is no notice period and no compensation is payable on loss of office.

Limits on Directors' Remuneration

The fees for the non-executive Directors are payable quarterly in arrears and are determined within the limit set out in the Company's Articles of Association which is currently £200,000 per annum in aggregate. Any change to this limit requires shareholder approval.

The basic and additional fees payable to Directors in respect of the year ended 31 October 2020 and the expected fees payable in respect of the year ending 31 October 2021 are set out in the table below. The fees payable to the Directors in the subsequent financial periods will be determined following an annual review of the Directors' fees.


Company Performance

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current period and include the most significant assessed risks of material misstatement (whether or not due to fraud) that we identified. These matters included those which had the greatest effect on the overall audit strategy; the allocation of resources in the audit; and directing the efforts of the engagement team. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

Risk

Our response to the risk

Key observations communicated to the Audit and Management Engagement Committee

Incorrect valuation or ownership of the investment portfolio (as described on page 33 in the Audit and Management Engagement Committee Report and the accounting policy set out on page 49).

The valuation of the investment portfolio at 31 October 2020 was £1,002.19m (2019 – £572.86m) consisting of quoted equities with an aggregate value of £941.39m (2019 – £540.68m) and unquoted equities with an aggregate value of £60.80m (2019 – £32.18m).

The valuation of the assets held in the investment portfolio is the key driver of the Company's net asset value and total return. Incorrect investment pricing, or a failure to maintain proper legal title to the investments held by the Company could have a significant impact on the portfolio valuation and the return generated for shareholders.

The fair value of quoted investments is determined by reference to bid value or the last traded price depending on the convention of the exchange on which the investment is quoted.

Unquoted investments are valued at fair value by the Directors following a detailed review and appropriate challenge of the valuations proposed by the Baillie Gifford Private Companies Valuation Group. The unquoted investment policy applies methodologies consistent with the International Private Equity and Venture Capital Valuation guidelines ('IPEV').

The valuation of the unquoted investments, and the resultant impact on the unrealised gains/(losses), is the area requiring the most significant judgement and estimation in the preparation of the financial statements.

We have performed the following procedures:

We obtained an understanding of Baillie Gifford's processes and controls surrounding investment title and pricing of quoted and unquoted securities by performing walkthrough procedures.

For quoted investments in the portfolio, we compared the market prices and exchange rates applied to an independent pricing vendor and recalculated the investment valuations as at the year-end.

We inspected the stale pricing reports produced by Baillie Gifford to identify prices that have not changed within 1 business day and verified whether the quoted price is a valid fair value.

For a sample of unquoted investments held as at the year-end we utilised our specialist Valuations and Business Modelling team to review and challenge the valuations. This included:

- Reviewing the valuation papers prepared by the Manager for the final quarter of the year;
- Assessing whether the valuations have been performed in line with the IPEV guidelines;
- Assessing the appropriateness of the data inputs and challenging the assumptions used to support the valuations; and
- Assessing other facts and circumstances, such as market movement and comparative company information, that have an impact on the fair market value of the investments.

For the remaining unquoted investments, we obtained and assessed the valuation papers to support the valuation of the investments as at 31 October 2020.

We recalculated the unrealised gains/(losses) on unquoted investments as at the year-end using the book-cost reconciliation and reviewed the level 3 fair value hierarchy disclosure. We tested 100% of unquoted investment purchases to share certificates and bank statements.

We compared the Company's investment holdings at 31 October 2020 to independent confirmations received directly from the Company's Custodian and Depositary, testing material reconciling items to supporting documentation.

The results of our procedures identified no material misstatement in relation to incorrect valuation or ownership of the investment portfolio.

Risk

Incomplete or inaccurate revenue recognition, including the classification of special dividends as revenue or capital in the Income Statement (per the Audit and Management Engagement Committee report set out on page 33 and the accounting policy set out on page 50).

The total revenue for the year to 31 October 2020 was £0.77 m (2019: £1.23m), consisting primarily of dividend income from quoted equity investments.

There is a risk of incomplete or inaccurate recognition of revenue through the failure to recognise proper income entitlements or to apply an appropriate accounting treatment.

The total special dividends received by the Company amounted to £0.06m. The directors are required to exercise judgment in determining whether income receivable in the form of special dividends should be classified as 'revenue' or 'capital' in the Income Statement.

Failure to adequately disclose the impact of Covid-19 (as described on pages 8 to 10 in the Strategic Report, page 34 in the Audit and Management Engagement Committee's Report and as per the accounting policy set out on page 48).

The Covid-19 pandemic has adversely impacted global commercial activity and contributed to significant volatility in global equity and debt markets. As of the date of our audit report, the longer-term impact remains uncertain. This uncertainty had an impact on our risk assessment and, as a result, on our audit of the financial statements.

The Covid-19 pandemic had the most significant impact on our audit of the financial statements in the following areas:

Going concern

There is increased uncertainty in certain assumptions underlying management's assessment of future prospects, including the impact of Covid-19 on the Company continuing to meet debt obligations and the ability to fund ongoing costs.

Financial statement disclosures

There is a risk that the impact of Covid-19 is not adequately disclosed in the financial statements.

Our response to the risk

We performed the following procedures:

We obtained an understanding of Baillie Gifford's processes and controls surrounding revenue recognition by performing walkthrough procedures.

For 100% of dividends, we recalculated the income by multiplying the investment holdings at the ex-dividend date, traced from the accounting records, by the dividend per share, which was agreed to an independent data vendor. We agreed a sample to bank statements and, where applicable, we also agreed the exchange rates to an external source.

To test completeness of recorded income, we tested that a sample of expected dividends for each investee company had been recorded as income with reference to investee company announcements obtained from an independent data vendor.

We performed a review of the income and acquisition and disposal reports produced by Baillie Gifford to identify all dividends received and accrued during the period that were above our testing threshold. There were no special dividends above our testing threshold individually or in aggregate.

Key observations communicated to the Audit and Management Engagement Committee

The results of our procedures identified no material misstatement in relation to incomplete or inaccurate revenue recognition, including incorrect classification of special dividends as revenue or capital in the Income Statement.

We performed the following procedures: Going Concern

We inspected the Directors' assessment of going concern, which includes consideration of the impact of Covid-19, and challenged the assumptions made in the preparation of the revenue and expenses forecast. We have verified the inputs and assumptions used in the assessment to historically observed results of the Company.

We inspected the Directors' assessment of the risk of breaching the debt covenants as a result of a future reduction in the value of the Company's portfolio. We recalculated the Company's compliance with debt covenants in the scenarios assessed by the Directors.

Financial statements disclosures

We reviewed the adequacy of the Covid-19 and going concern disclosures by evaluating whether they were consistent with the Directors' assessment. We reviewed the disclosures for compliance with the reporting requirements

As a result of our procedures we have determined that the Directors' conclusion that there is no material uncertainty relating to going concern is appropriate. We have reviewed the disclosures relating to Covid-19 and going concern and determined that they are appropriate.

We re-assessed the risks determined in the prior year and due to the uncertainty in global markets caused by the Covid-19 pandemic, we have included a key audit matter titled 'Failure to adequately disclose the impact of Covid-19'. Our other key audit matters are unchanged from the prior year.

An Overview of the Scope of Our Audit

Tailoring the Scope

Our assessment of audit risk, our evaluation of materiality and our allocation of performance materiality determine our audit scope for the Company. This enables us to form an opinion on the financial statements. We consider size, risk profile, the organisation of the Company and effectiveness of controls, including controls and changes in the business environment when assessing the level of work to be performed. All audit work was performed directly by the audit engagement team.

Our Application of Materiality

We apply the concept of materiality in planning and performing the audit, in evaluating the effect of identified misstatements on the audit and in forming our audit opinion.

Materiality

The magnitude of an omission or misstatement that, individually or in the aggregate, could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of the users of the financial statements. Materiality provides a basis for determining the nature and extent of our audit procedures.

We determined materiality for the Company to be $\mathfrak{L}9.92m$ (2019 – $\mathfrak{L}5.37m$) which is 1% of shareholders' funds. We believe that shareholders' funds provide us with materiality aligned to the key measurement of the Company's performance.

Performance Materiality

The application of materiality at the individual account or balance level. It is set at an amount to reduce to an appropriately low level the probability that the aggregate of uncorrected and undetected misstatements exceeds materiality.

On the basis of our risk assessments, together with our assessment of the Company's overall control environment, our judgment was that performance materiality was 75% (2019 – 75%) of our planning materiality, namely £7.44m (2019 – £4.03m). We have set performance materiality at this percentage due to our past experience of the audit that indicates a lower risk of misstatements, both corrected and uncorrected.

Reporting Threshold

An amount below which identified misstatements are considered as being clearly trivial.

We agreed with the Audit and Management Engagement Committee that we would report to them all uncorrected audit differences in excess of £0.50m (2019 - £0.27m) which is set at 5% of planning materiality, as well as differences below that threshold that, in our view, warranted reporting on qualitative grounds.

We evaluate any uncorrected misstatements against both the quantitative measures of materiality discussed above and in light of other relevant qualitative considerations in forming our opinion.

Other Information

The other information comprises the information included in the annual report set out on pages 1 to 37 and 65 to 73, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The directors are responsible for the other information.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in this report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether there is a material misstatement in the financial statements or a material misstatement of the other information. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of the other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

In this context, we also have nothing to report in regard to our responsibility to specifically address the following items in the other information and to report as uncorrected material misstatements of the other information where we conclude that those items meet the following conditions:

- Directors' statement of compliance with the UK Corporate Governance Code set out on page 29 – the parts of the directors' statement required under the Listing Rules relating to the Company's compliance with the UK Corporate Governance Code containing provisions specified for review by the auditor in accordance with Listing Rule 9.8.10R(2) do not properly disclose a departure from a relevant provision of the UK Corporate Governance Code.

Opinions on Other Matters Prescribed by the Companies Act 2006

In our opinion the part of the directors' remuneration report to be audited has been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006.

In our opinion, based on the work undertaken in the course of the audit:

- the information given in the strategic report and the directors' report for the financial year for which the financial statements are prepared is consistent with the financial statements; and
- the strategic report and directors' reports have been prepared in accordance with applicable legal requirements.

Matters on which we are required to Report by Exception

In the light of the knowledge and understanding of the Company and its environment obtained in the course of the audit, we have not identified material misstatements in the strategic report or directors' report.

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Companies Act 2006 requires us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- adequate accounting records have not been kept, or returns adequate for our audit have not been received from branches not visited by us; or
- the financial statements and the part of the Directors'
 Remuneration Report to be audited are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or

- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

In preparing the financial statements, the directors are responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Explanation as to what Extent the Audit was Considered Capable of Detecting Irregularities, including Fraud

The objectives of our audit, in respect to fraud, are; to identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements due to fraud; to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the assessed risks of material misstatement due to fraud, through designing and implementing appropriate responses; and to respond appropriately to fraud or suspected fraud identified during the audit. However, the primary responsibility for the prevention and detection of fraud rests with both those charged with governance of the entity and management.

Our approach was as follows:

- We obtained an understanding of the legal and regulatory frameworks that are applicable to the Company and determined that the most significant are FRS 102, the Companies Act 2006, the Listing Rules, the UK Corporate Governance Code and Section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The Company was incorporated under the Companies Act 2006 in Scotland as a public limited company with registered number SC184775. The Company is an investment company within the meaning of section 833 of the Companies Act 2006 and carries on business as an investment trust.

1 Principal Accounting Policies

The Financial Statements for the year to 31 October 2020 have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and on the basis of the accounting policies set out below which are unchanged from the prior year and have been applied consistently.

(a) Basis of Accounting

All of the Company's operations are of a continuing nature and the Financial Statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of fixed asset investments at fair value through profit or loss, and on the assumption that approval as an investment trust under section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and the Investment Trust (Approved Company) (Tax) Regulations 2011 will be retained. The Board has, in particular, considered the impact of heightened market volatility since the coronavirus (Covid-19) outbreak but does not believe the Company's going concern status is affected. The Company's assets, the majority of which are investments in quoted securities which are readily realisable, exceed its liabilities significantly. All borrowings require the prior approval of the Board. Gearing levels and compliance with borrowing covenants are reviewed by the Board on a regular basis. The Company has continued to comply with the investment trust status requirements of section 1158 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and the Investment Trust (Approved Company) (Tax) Regulations 2011. The Company's primary third party suppliers, including its Managers and Secretaries, Depositary and Custodian, Registrar, Auditor and Broker, are not experiencing significant operational difficulties affecting their respective services to the Company. Accordingly, the Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as it is the Directors' opinion, having assessed the principal and emerging risks and other matters including the impact of the coronavirus outbreak set out in the Viability Statement on page 10 which assesses the prospects of the Company over a period of five years, that the Company will continue in operational existence for a period of at least twelve months from the date of approval of these Financial

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards and with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Financial Statements of Investment Trust Companies and Venture Capital Trusts' issued by the Association of Investment Companies ('AIC') in November 2014 and updated in October 2019 with consequential amendments.

In order to reflect better the activities of the Company and in accordance with guidance issued by the AIC, supplementary information which analyses the profit and loss account between items of a revenue and capital nature has been presented in the Income Statement.

(b) Functional Currency

The Directors consider the Company's functional and presentational currency to be sterling as the Company's share capital is denominated in sterling, the entity is listed on a sterling stock exchange in the UK, the Company's shareholders are predominantly based in the UK and the Company and its investment manager, who are subject to the UK's regulatory environment, are also UK based.

(c) Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the Company's Balance Sheet when it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

(d) Accounting Estimates, Assumptions and Judgements

The preparation of the Financial Statements requires the use of estimates, assumptions and judgements. These estimates, assumptions and judgements affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, at the reporting date. While estimates are based on best judgement using information and financial data available, the actual outcome may differ from these estimates. The key sources of estimation and uncertainty relate to the fair value of the unlisted investments.

Judgements

The Directors consider that the preparation of the Financial Statements involves the following key judgements:

- (i) the determination of the functional currency of the Company as sterling (see rationale in 1(b) above); and
- (ii) the fair valuation of the unlisted investments.

The key judgements in the fair valuation process are:

- (i) the Managers' determination of the appropriate application of the International Private Equity and Venture Capital Valuation ('IPEV') Guidelines 2018 to each unlisted investment; and
- (ii) the Directors' consideration of whether each fair value is appropriate following detailed review and challenge. The judgement applied in the selection of the methodology used (see 1(e) below) for determining the fair value of each unlisted investment can have a significant impact upon the valuation.

Estimates

The key estimate in the Financial Statements is the determination of the fair value of the unlisted investments by the Managers for consideration by the Directors. This estimate is key as it significantly impacts the valuation of the unlisted investments at the Balance Sheet date. The fair valuation process involves estimation using subjective inputs that are unobservable (for which market data is unavailable). The main estimates involved in the selection of the valuation process inputs are:

- the selection of appropriate comparable companies in order to derive revenue multiples and meaningful relationships between enterprise value, revenue and earnings growth.
 Comparable companies are chosen on the basis of their business characteristics and growth patterns;
- (ii) the selection of a revenue metric (either historical or forecast);
- (iii) the application of an appropriate discount factor to reflect the reduced liquidity of unlisted companies versus their listed peers;

- (iv) the estimation of the probability assigned to an exit being through an initial public offering ('IPO') or a company sale;
- (v) the selection of an appropriate industry benchmark index to assist with the valuation validation or the application of valuation adjustments, particularly in the absence of established earnings or closely comparable peers; and
- (vi) the calculation of valuation adjustments derived from milestone analysis (i.e. incorporating operational success against the plan/forecasts of the business into the valuation).

Fair value estimates are cross-checked to alternative estimation methods where possible to improve the robustness of the estimates. As the valuation outcomes may differ from the fair value estimates a price sensitivity analysis is provided in Other Price Risk Sensitivity in note 16 on pages 60 to 62 to illustrate the effect on the Financial Statements of an over or under estimation of fair values. The risk of an over or under estimation of fair values is greater when methodologies are applied using more subjective inputs.

Assumptions

The determination of fair value by the Managers involves key assumptions dependent upon the valuation technique used. As explained in 1(e) below, the primary technique applied under the IPEV Guidelines is the Multiples approach. Where the Multiples approach is used the valuation process recognises also, as stated in the IPEV Guidelines, that the price of a recent investment may be an appropriate calibration for estimating fair value. The Multiples approach involves subjective inputs and therefore presents a greater risk of over or under estimation and particularly in the absence of a recent transaction.

The key assumptions for the Multiples approach are that the selection of comparable companies provides a reasonable basis for identifying relationships between enterprise value, revenue and growth to apply in the determination of fair value. Other assumptions include:

- (i) the discount applied for reduced liquidity versus listed peers;
- (ii) the probabilities assigned to an exit being through either an IPO or a company sale; and
- (iii) that the application of milestone analysis and industry benchmark indices are a reasonable basis for applying appropriate adjustments to the valuations. Valuations are cross-checked for reasonableness to alternative Multiplesbased approaches or benchmark index movements as appropriate.

(e) Investments

The Company's investments are classified, recognised and measured at fair value through profit in accordance with sections 11 and 12 of FRS 102. Changes in the fair value of investments and gains and losses on disposal are recognised as capital items in the Income Statement.

Recognition and Initial Measurement

Purchases and sales of investments are accounted for on a trade date basis. Expenses incidental to purchase and sale are written off to capital at the time of acquisition or disposal. All investments are designated as valued at fair value through profit or loss upon initial recognition and are measured at subsequent reporting dates at fair value.

Measurement and Valuation

Listed Investments – The fair value of listed security investments is bid value or, in the case of holdings on certain recognised overseas exchanges, at last traded prices.

Unlisted Investments – Unlisted investments are valued at fair value by the Directors following a detailed review and appropriate challenge of the valuations proposed by the Managers. The Managers' unlisted investment valuation policy applies techniques consistent with the IPEV Guidelines.

The techniques applied are predominantly market-based approaches. The market-based approaches available under IPEV Guidelines are set out below and are followed by an explanation of how they are applied to the Company's unlisted portfolio:

- Multiples;
- Industry Valuation Benchmarks; and
- Available Market Prices.

The nature of the unlisted portfolio currently will influence the valuation technique applied. The valuation approach recognises that, as stated in the IPEV Guidelines, the price of a recent investment, if resulting from an orderly transaction, generally represents fair value as at the transaction date and may be an appropriate starting point for estimating fair value at subsequent measurement dates. However, consideration is given to the facts and circumstances as at the subsequent measurement date, including changes in the market or performance of the investee company. Milestone analysis is used where appropriate to incorporate the operational progress of the investee company into the valuation. Additionally, the background to the transaction must be considered. As a result, various Multiples-based techniques are employed to assess the valuations particularly in those companies with established revenues. Discounted cashflows are used where appropriate. An absence of relevant industry peers may preclude the application of the Industry Valuation Benchmarks technique and an absence of observable prices may preclude the Available Market Prices approach. All valuations are cross-checked for reasonableness by employing relevant alternative techniques.

The unlisted investments are valued according to a three monthly cycle of measurement dates from the date of purchase. The fair value of the unlisted investments will also be reviewed before the next scheduled three monthly measurement date on the following occasions:

- at the year end and half year end of the Company; and
- where there is an indication of a change in fair value as defined in the IPEV guidelines (commonly referred to as 'trigger' events).

Gains and Losses

Gains and losses on investments, including those arising from foreign currency exchange differences, are recognised in the Income Statement as capital items. The Managers monitor the investment portfolio on a fair value basis and uses the fair value basis for investments in making investment decisions and monitoring financial performance.

(f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits repayable on demand. Deposits are repayable on demand if they can be withdrawn at any time without notice and without penalty or if they have a maturity or period of notice of not more than one working day.

(g) Income

- (i) Income from equity investments is brought into account on the date on which the investments are quoted ex-dividend or, where no ex-dividend date is quoted, when the Company's right to receive payment is established.
- (ii) If scrip dividends are taken in lieu of dividends in cash, the net amount of the cash dividend declared is credited to the revenue column of the Income Statement. Any excess in the value of the shares received over the amount of the cash dividend foregone is recognised in the capital column of the Income Statement.
- (iii) Special dividends are treated as capital or revenue depending on the facts of each particular case.
- (iv) Unfranked investment income and overseas dividends include the taxes deducted at source.
- (v) Underwriting commission and interest receivable on deposits is recognised on an accruals basis.

(h) Expenses

All expenses are accounted for on an accruals basis. Expenses are charged to the revenue column of the Income Statement except:

- (i) where they relate directly to the acquisition or disposal of an investment (transaction costs), in which case they are charged to the capital within gains/losses on investments; and
- (ii) they relate directly to the buy-back/issuance of shares, in which case they are added to the buy-back cost or deducted from the share issuance proceeds.

The investment management fee is allocated 25% to revenue and 75% to capital, in line with the Board's expectation of returns from the Company's investments over the long term in the form of revenue and capital respectively.

(i) Borrowings and Finance Costs

Any borrowings are carried in the Balance Sheet at amortised cost, representing the cumulative amount of net proceeds after issue, plus accrued finance costs. The finance costs of borrowings are allocated 25% to the revenue account and 75% to the capital reserve. Gains and losses on the repurchase or early settlement of debt are wholly charged to capital.

(i) Deferred Taxation

Deferred taxation is provided on all timing differences which have originated but not reversed by the Balance Sheet date, calculated at the current tax rates expected to apply when its timing differences reverse, based on what has been enacted or substantially enacted, relevant to the benefit or liability. Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it will be more likely than not that there will be taxable profits from which underlying timing differences can be deducted.

(k) Foreign Currencies

Transactions involving foreign currencies are converted at the rate ruling at the time of the transaction. Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated at the closing rates of exchange at the Balance Sheet date. Any gain or loss arising from a change in exchange rate subsequent to the date of the transaction is included as an exchange gain or loss in the Income Statement and classified as a revenue or capital item as appropriate.

(I) Capital Reserve

Gains and losses on disposal of investments, changes in the fair value of investments held, exchange differences of a capital nature and the amount by which other assets and liabilities valued at fair value differ from their book cost are dealt with in this reserve. Purchases of the Company's own shares can also be funded from this reserve. 75% of management fees and finance costs are allocated to the capital reserve in line with the Board's expectation of returns from the Company's investments over the long term in the form of revenue and capital respectively.

(m) Single Segment Reporting

The Company has only one material segment being that of an investment trust company, investing primarily in listed companies throughout the world.

The New Ordinary Shares were admitted to the Official List of the UK Listing Authority and to trading on the London Stock Exchange's market for listed securities at 8.00am on 28 January 2019). Accordingly, the 57,389,739 ordinary shares of 5p in issue as at 23 January 2019 were sub-divided into 286,948,695 ordinary shares of 1p.

The Company has authority to allot shares under section 551 of the Companies Act 2006. The Board has authorised use of this authority to issue new shares at a premium to net asset value in order to enhance the net asset value per share for existing shareholders and improve the liquidity of the Company's shares. In the year to 31 October 2020 the Company issued a total of 51,720,000 shares on a non preemptive basis (nominal value of £517,000, representing 17.1% of the issued share capital at 31 October 2019) at a premium to net asset value (on the basis of debt valued at book value) raising net proceeds of £133,044,000 (In the year to 31 October 2019 – 16,525,000 shares with a nominal value of £165,000, representing 5.8% of the issued share capital at 31 October 2018 raising net proceeds of £30,895,000).

The Company also has authority to buy back shares. In the year to 31 October 2020 no ordinary shares were bought back therefore the Company's authority remains unchanged at 45,359,544 ordinary shares.

16 Financial Instruments

As an Investment Trust, the Company invests in listed and unlisted securities and makes other investments so as to meet its investment objective of achieving long term capital growth. The Company borrows money when the Board and Managers have sufficient conviction that the assets funded by borrowed monies will generate a return in excess of the cost of borrowing. In pursuing its investment objective, the Company is exposed to various types of risk that are associated with the financial instruments and markets in which it invests.

These risks are categorised here as market risk (comprising currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk), liquidity risk and credit risk. The Board monitors closely the Company's exposures to these risks but does so in order to reduce the likelihood of a permanent loss of capital rather than to minimise the short term volatility. Risk provides the potential for both losses and gains and in assessing risk the Board encourages the Managers to exploit the opportunities that risk affords.

The risk management policies and procedures outlined in this note have not changed substantially from the previous accounting period.

Market Risk

The fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument or other investment held by the Company may fluctuate because of changes in market prices. This market risk comprises three elements – currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. The Board of Directors reviews and agrees policies for managing these risks and the Company's Investment Managers both assess the exposure to market risk when making individual investment decisions and monitor the overall level of market risk across the investment portfolio on an ongoing basis.

Details of the Company's investment portfolio are shown in note 8 and on pages 53 and 54.

(i) Currency Risk

Certain of the Company's assets, liabilities and income are denominated in currencies other than sterling (the Company's functional currency and that in which it reports its results). Consequently, movements in exchange rates may affect the sterling value of those items.

The Managers monitor the Company's exposure to foreign currencies and report to the Board on a regular basis. The Managers assess the risk to the Company of the foreign currency exposure by considering the effect on the Company's net asset value and income of a movement in the rates of exchange to which the Company's assets, liabilities, income and expenses are exposed. However, the country in which a company is listed is not necessarily where it earns its profits. The movement in exchange rates on overseas earnings may have a more significant impact upon a company's valuation than a simple translation of the currency in which the company is quoted.

Foreign currency borrowings can limit the Company's exposure to anticipated future changes in exchange rates which might otherwise adversely affect the value of the portfolio of investments.

Interest rate movements may affect directly:

- the fair value of investments in fixed interest rate securities;
- the level of income receivable on cash deposits;
- the fair value of fixed-rate borrowings; and
- the interest payable on any variable rate borrowings.

Interest rate movements may also impact upon the market value of the Company's investments outwith fixed income securities. The effect of interest rate movements upon the earnings of a company may have a significant impact upon the valuation of that company's equity.

The possible effects on fair value and cash flows that could arise as a result of changes in interest rates are taken into account when making investment decisions and when entering borrowing agreements.

The Board reviews on a regular basis the amount of investments in cash and fixed income securities and the income receivable on cash deposits, floating rate notes and other similar investments.

The Company finances part of its activities through borrowings at approved levels. The amount of such borrowings and the approved levels are monitored and reviewed regularly by the Board. Movements in interest rates, to the extent that they affect the market value of the Company's fixed rate borrowings, may also affect the amount by which the Company's share price is at a discount or a premium to the net asset value (assuming that the Company's share price is unaffected by movements in interest rates).

Interest Rate Risk Sensitivity

An increase of 100 basis points in interest rates, with all other variables held constant, would have decreased the Company's total net assets and total return for the year ended 31 October 2020 by £1,619,000 (2019 – decreased by £695,000). This is due to the Company's exposure to interest rates on its revolving floating rate bank loans and cash balances. A decrease of 100 basis points would have had an equal but opposite effect.

(iii) Other Price Risk

Changes in market prices other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk may also affect the value of the Company's net assets. The Board manages the market price risks inherent in the investment portfolio by ensuring full and timely access to relevant information from the Managers. The Company's portfolio of unlisted level 3 investments is not necessarily affected by market performance, however the valuations are affected by the performance of the underlying securities in line with the valuation criteria in note 1(e). The Board meets regularly and at each meeting reviews investment performance, the investment portfolio and the rationale for the current investment positioning to ensure consistency with the Company's objectives and investment policies. The portfolio does not seek to reproduce the comparative index: investments are selected based upon the merit of individual companies and therefore performance may well diverge from the short term fluctuations of the comparative index.

Other Price Risk Sensitivity

A full list of the Company's investments is given on pages 18 to 20. In addition, a geographical analysis of the portfolio and an analysis of the investment portfolio by broad industrial or commercial sector is given on pages 21 and 22.

94.9% (2019 – 100.7%) of the Company's net assets are invested in quoted equities. A 10% increase in quoted equity valuations at 31 October 2020 would have increased total assets and total return by £94,139,000 (2019 – £54,068,000). A decrease of 10% would have had an equal but opposite effect.

6.1% (2019 – 6.0%) of the Company's net assets are invested in unlisted securities. The fair valuation of the unlisted investments is influenced by the estimates, assumptions and judgements made in the fair valuation process (see 1(d) on pages 48 and 49).

The ongoing Covid-19 pandemic has heightened the estimation uncertainty for each of the unquoted investments held as at 31 October 2020. Each portfolio company has been categorised as being subject to potentially higher or lower estimation uncertainty by considering a range of factors including the potential disruption to business activities caused by measures adopted to tackle the spread of Covid-19 and the availability and extent of cash resources. A greater sensitivity factor has been applied to those investments assessed as being susceptible to higher estimation uncertainty. Whilst the sensitivities applied illustrate the impact of varying the key inputs by the levels specified, it is possible that applying reasonable alternative assumptions to individual investments could lead to measurements of fair value which vary to a greater extent than that illustrated.

The % sensitivity applied to each risk category is progressive and based on experience of valuation impacts during the pandemic so far. For the higher risk companies the impact of Covid-19 is much more uncertain and challenging to predict therefore a higher sensitivity of 50% is applied to reflect that, scaling down to 25% and 10% for medium and low risk respectively given their greater insulation to the impacts of Covid-19. When determining whether an investment valuation was felt to be low, medium or high risk with respect to sensitivity to Covid-19, several factors were considered such the impact of Covid-19 on the relevant industry, liquidity concerns for the specific company, and operational impacts on the business. For example, more broadly, a company operating in the travel sector would be deemed to be high risk, however a gaming company with a substantial cash runway would be low. Given the nature of the private companies held within the portfolio, we do not consider any of these to be classed as higher risk. The table below reflects both the potential negative and positive impacts of Covid-19, recognising there are investments in the total value that in our view bear increased valuation uncertainty in relation to positive impacts from Covid-19. The combined value of the holdings felt to be most likely to see positive impact is £22,063,000. An example of one of these holdings would include Akili Therapeutics, a digital medicine provider, who accelerated their product launch in response to the Covid-19 pandemic and recently received FDA clearance for its digital therapy used to treat ADHD in children, leading to an increase in valuation.

To provide further indication of how much of the unlisted portfolio is felt to sit in each risk category, the table below has split out each risk category and applies sensitivities to each. The sensitivities give an indication of the effect of changing one or more of the inputs to these valuations and the impact of increased volatility depending on exposure to the impacts of Covid-19.

Adjusted recent transactions involve reviewing the movements in index performance and comparable company share prices from the last transaction date to the valuation point. Consideration is also given to the probability of different liquidation scenarios. For the investments where an adjusted recent transaction was appropriate, the index performance movement ranged from 15.7% to 26.7% and the comparable share prices ranged from (44.6%) to 29.5%. The probability of all liquidation scenarios were deemed to be equal. These movements and scenarios were considered along with the last transaction price to determine a fair value at the valuation point.

The unlisted securities sensitivity analysis below which recognises that the valuation methodologies employed involve different levels of subjectivity in their inputs. The sensitivity analysis would apply a wider range of input variable sensitivity to the Multiples methodology as it would involve more significant subjective estimation than the recent Transaction method (the risk of over or under estimation is higher due to the greater subjectivity involved, for example, in selecting the most relevant measure of sustainable revenues and identifying appropriate comparable companies).

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic only emerging during the year ended 31 October 2020 the comparatives for Other Price Risk Sensitivity are presented considering known risks at the prior reporting date and exclude possible fluctuations due to Covid-19.

* Key Variable Inputs

The variable inputs applicable to each broad category of valuation basis will vary dependent on the particular circumstances of each unlisted company valuation. An explanation of each of the key variable inputs is provided below and includes an indication of the range in value for each input, where relevant. The assumptions made in the production of the inputs are described in note 1(d) on pages 48 and 49.

Selection of Appropriate Benchmarks

The selection of appropriate benchmarks is assessed individually for each investment. The industry and geography of each company are key inputs to the benchmark selection, with either one or two key indices or benchmarks being used for comparison.

Selection of Comparable Companies

The selection of comparable companies is assessed individually for each investment at the point of investment, and the relevance of the comparable companies is continually evaluated at each valuation. The key criteria used in selecting appropriate comparable companies are the industry sector in which they operate, the geography of the company's operations, the respective revenue and earnings growth rates and the operating margins. Typically, between 4 and 10 comparable companies will be selected for each investment, depending on how many relevant comparable companies are identified. The resultant revenue or earnings multiples derived will vary depending on the companies selected and the industries they operate in and can vary in the range of 1x to 10x.

Probability Estimation of Liquidation Events

The probability of a liquidation event such as a company sale, or alternatively an initial public offering ('IPO'), is a key variable input in the Transaction-based and Multiples-based valuation techniques. The probability of an IPO versus a company sale is typically estimated from the outset to be 50:50 if there has been no indication by the company of pursuing either of these routes. If the company has indicated an intention to IPO, the probability is increased accordingly to 75% and if an IPO has become a certainty the probability is increased to 100%. Likewise, in a scenario where a company is pursuing a trade sale the weightings will be adjusted accordingly in favour of a sale scenario, or in a situation where a company is underperforming expectations significantly and therefore deemed very unlikely to pursue an IPO.

Application of Valuation Basis

Each investment is assessed independently, and the valuation basis applied will vary depending on the circumstances of each investment. When an investment is pre-revenue, the focus of the valuation will be on assessing the recent transaction and the achievement of key milestones since investment. Adjustments may also be made depending on the performance of comparable benchmarks and companies. For those investments where a trading Multiples approach can be taken, the methodology will factor in revenue, earnings or net assets as appropriate for the investment, and where a suitable correlation can be identified with the comparable companies then a regression analysis will be performed. Discounted cash flows will also be considered where appropriate forecasts are available.

Estimated Sustainable Earnings

The selection of sustainable revenue or earnings will depend on whether the company is sustainably profitable or not, and where it is not then sustainable revenues will be used in the valuation. The valuation approach will typically assess companies based on the last twelve months of revenue or earnings, as they are the most recent available and therefore viewed as the most reliable. Where a company has reliably forecasted earnings previously or there is a change in circumstance at the business which will impact earnings going forward, then forward estimated revenue or earnings may be used instead.

Application of Liquidity Discount

The application of a liquidity discount will be applied either through the calibration of a valuation against the most recent transaction, or by application of a specific discount. The discount applied where a calibration is not appropriate is typically 10%, reflecting that the majority of the investments held are substantial companies with some secondary market activity.

Liquidity Risk

This is the risk that the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities.

Liquidity risk is not significant as the majority of the Company's assets are investments in quoted securities that are readily realisable. The Board monitors the exposure to any one holding.

The Company has the power to take out borrowings, which gives it access to additional funding when required. The Company's borrowing facilities are detailed in note 10 and the maturity profile of its borrowings are set out on page 59.

Credit Risk

This is the risk that a failure of a counterparty to a transaction to discharge its obligations under that transaction could result in the Company suffering a loss.

This risk is managed as follows:

- where the Managers make an investment in a bond or other security with credit risk, that credit risk is assessed and then compared to the prospective investment return of the security in question;
- the Depositary is liable for the loss of financial instruments held in custody. The Depositary will ensure that any delegate segregates the assets of the Company. The Managers monitor the Company's risk by reviewing the Custodian's internal control reports and reporting its findings to the Board;
- investment transactions are carried out with a large number of brokers whose creditworthiness is reviewed by the Managers. Transactions are ordinarily undertaken on a delivery versus payment basis whereby the Company's Custodian bank ensures that the counterparty to any transaction entered into by the Company has delivered on its obligations before any transfer of cash or securities away from the Company is completed;
- the creditworthiness of the counterparty to transactions involving derivatives, and other arrangements wherein the creditworthiness of the entity acting as broker or counterparty to the transaction is likely to be of sustained interest, are subject to rigorous assessment by the Managers of the creditworthiness of that counterparty; and
- cash is only held at banks that are regularly reviewed by the Managers.

The Company owns a number of unquoted preference share securities. Some of these may have been classified as debt by the issuer. There are no material amounts past due in relation to these securities. As these instruments (alongside the ordinary share securities) have been recognised at fair value through profit and loss, the fair value takes into account credit, market and other price risk.





Net Liquid Assets

Net liquid assets comprise current assets less current liabilities, excluding borrowings.

Discount/Premium (APM)

As stock markets and share prices vary, an investment trust's share price is rarely the same as its net asset value. When the share price is lower than the net asset value per share it is said to be trading at a discount. The size of the discount is calculated by subtracting the share price from the net asset value per share and is usually expressed as a percentage of the net asset value per share. If the share price is higher than the net asset value per share, this situation is called a premium.

Total Return (APM)

The total return is the return to shareholders after reinvesting the net dividend on the date that the share price goes ex-dividend.

Compound Annual Return (APM)

The compound annual return converts the return over a period of longer than one year to a constant annual rate of return applied to the compound value at the start of each year.

Ongoing Charges (APM)

The total recurring expenses (excluding the Company's cost of dealing in investments and borrowing costs) incurred by the Company as a percentage of the average net asset value (with debt at fair value). The ongoing charges have been calculated on the basis prescribed by the Association of Investment Companies.

Gearing (APM)

At its simplest, gearing is borrowing. Just like any other public company, an investment trust can borrow money to invest in additional investments for its portfolio. The effect of the borrowing on the shareholders' assets is called 'gearing'. If the Company's assets grow, the shareholders' assets grow proportionately more because the debt remains the same. But if the value of the Company's assets falls, the situation is reversed. Gearing can therefore enhance performance in rising markets but can adversely impact performance in falling markets.

Gearing is the Company's borrowings at book value less cash and cash equivalents (including any outstanding trade settlements) expressed as a percentage of shareholders' funds.

Leverage (APM)

For the purposes of the Alternative Investment Fund Managers Directive, leverage is any method which increases the Company's exposure, including the borrowing of cash and the use of derivatives. It is expressed as a ratio between the Company's exposure and its net asset value and can be calculated on a gross and a commitment method. Under the gross method, exposure represents the sum of the Company's positions after the deduction of sterling cash balances, without taking into account any hedging and netting arrangements. Under the commitment method, exposure is calculated without the deduction of sterling cash balances and after certain hedging and netting positions are offset against each other.

Active Share (APM)

Active share, a measure of how actively a portfolio is managed, is the percentage of the portfolio that differs from its comparative index. It is calculated by deducting from 100 the percentage of the portfolio that overlaps with the comparative index. An active share of 100 indicates no overlap with the index and an active share of zero indicates a portfolio that tracks the index.

Share Split

A share split (or stock split) is the process by which a company divides its existing shares into multiple shares. Although the number of shares outstanding increases, the total value of the shares remains the same with respect to the pre-split value.

Unlisted Company

An unlisted company means a company whose shares are not available to the general public for trading and not listed on a stock exchange.
